

Too Sick to Fly?

WHAT YOU CAN DO WHEN YOU BECOME ILL WHILE YOU'RE AWAY ON HOLIDAY.

Te all know not to fly when we're sick - an airplane is a petri dish for germs. But what if you're already at your destination when you catch something? We interviewed Devyani Lal, M.D., a rhinologist at the Mayo Clinic's Arizona campus, for advice including how to alleviate your symptoms and avoid infecting other travelers.



Postpone your flight

"If you are really sick, you should just stay at your destination," Dr Lal says. Most airlines let you rebook, but you'll be charged a cancellation fee (anywhere from \$100 to \$150, depending on the type of ticket you purchased) and any difference in airfare. Travel Insurance may cover the cost of rescheduling your flight, though you will probably need a doctor's certificate. Smartraveller.com.au states travel insurance is as essential as your passport, regardless of your travel destination. If you can't afford travel insurance, you can't afford to travel! If you incur medical expenses while overseas and you don't have travel insurance, you are personally liable for covering these costs. The Government cannot pay for medical expenses overseas. Nor will your domestic private health insurance. Some travel insurance offer a trip-interruption benefit that includes illness. So if you're too sick to board the plane and you get a doctors certificate you may be covered.

If you must travel, wear a mask

It will undoubtedly call attention to you, and that's probably a good thing. If you're

sick "you're creating a virus factory," Dr Lal says, and you don't want to subject others to your germs. (As Lal points out, 90 percent of colds are caused by viruses, which are highly contagious. Bacterial infections are less common and don't spread as easily.) Some pharmacies and airport vendors sell masks.

Congestion relief

The Neti pot is an Indian device used to clean out the sinuses: You pour warm, salty water from the pot into one nostril and let it drain out the other. "The Neti pot has very low side effects and is well tolerated by most patients, Dr. Lal says. "I'd say that 99 percent of my patients like it." As another option, try squirting salty water (either previously boiled or distilled) into your nostrils with a plastic squeeze bottle. Both Neti pots and nasal squeeze bottles are sold at pharmacies. (Be sure to clean the Neti pot or squeeze bottle as directed between uses.*)

Help for a sinus infection


Start treatment with a nasal decongestant (such as Vicks Sinex), since there are fewer side effects, Dr. Lal says. If that doesn't help, try an oral decongestant such as Sudafed.

(Don't take Sudafed if you have severe high blood pressure, or severe coronary artery disease.) To keep your ears from hurting during the flight, use a nasal spray 25 minutes before takeoff and 25 minutes before landing. "The lining of the nose is connected to the eustachian tube, which equalizes pressure from the ear to prevent pain," Dr. Lal explains.

Antibiotics - the last resort

As viruses cause most sinus infections and colds, antibiotics are useless against them (and a cold will go away in a week anyway). But should your cold not go away after a week, or has gotten worse, you may have a bacterial infection. See a doctor, who may prescribe antibiotics. If you're prone to infection and are traveling to a country where finding antibiotics may be difficult, consider asking your doctor to give you a short course of antibiotics to carry with you just in case.





THE RIVIERA

Château de Crémat

The intertwined C's carved into the stonework and etched into the windows here should look familiar. That's right, they make up the Chanel logo, except Crémat had the logo first. In the 1920s, Coco Chanel was pals with the then owner, and he gave her the copyright as a gift. (The château's logo is now CK, for current owner Cornelis Kamerbeek.) Crémat stands in the hills above Nice in the Bellet appellation, the smallest in France. Don't miss the Terrasse du Ciel (Terrace of Heaven) for its panoramic view of Nice and the sea. The easiest way to get there is on the No. 62 bus from Nice. Catch it at the Magnan bus station, and after a scenic 25-minute ride, it will stop right outside the château's gates. 442 Chemin de Crémat, Nice

Clos Sainte Magdeleine

This is the Miss World of vineyards, set on a thumb-shaped peninsula high above the Mediterranean. The wines are from the Cassis appellation (pronounced cass-see to distinguish it from the black currant liqueur) and the estate is best known for its white wine, exotic with notes of almond and honey. The tour takes in the domaine, where groves of olive, mulberry and almond trees grow, and the cellar, concluding with a tasting (\$18 per person). Cassis, a particularly comely town, is 15 miles southeast of Marseilles. For one of the most scenic drives on this coast, follow the winding Route du Crête from Cassis to La Ciotat. clossaintemagdeleine.fr

RHONE VALLEY

Château de Beaucastel

This top winery shows off the rugged vineyard landscape of Châteauneuf-du-Pape. The terrain's chief peculiarity is its galets, softball-sized stones that look like the remnants of a meteor shower. In fact, they were torn from the Alps during the last Ice Age and deposited here. Some experts say the stones help ripen the grapes by absorbing heat during the day and releasing it at night. Beaucastel, one of Châteauneuf-du-Pape's best, is the only property that still uses all 13 grape varietals permitted by law in the appellation. You will be delighted by the impressive barrel room and the charming tour guide. By appointment only; beaucastel.com

Domaine de Coyeux

Beaumes-de-Venise, 20 miles northeast of Avignon, is the sweet spot of the Rhone Valley, known particularly for its dessert wine made from muscat, once called the Nectar of the Pope. The tasting room at this top producer, which also makes red wine, has an impossibly beautiful setting. The vineyards undulate away toward robust rock outcroppings called the Dentelles de Montmirail for their teethlike shape. The tasting room is in a modern rendition of a traditional Provençal mas, or farmhouse. Route de Lafare, Beaumes-de-Venise

Château la Canorgue

This property is in Bonnieux, the classic Provençal hill town that formed the heart of the world described by Peter Mayle in his best seller, "A Good Year". In fact, the 17th-century château is such an exempla - honey-colored stone, cornflower-blue shutters - that it was the setting for the 2006 film of the same name, starring Russell Crowe and Albert Finney. (Trivia: A swimming pool installed for the movie was later covered over and the ground replanted with vines.) The château is known for its handsome blue bottles - more like packaging for Swedish water than for French wine. Route du Pont Julien, Bonnieux







Tobago, power down your smartphone and put away your shoes. No, really, thongs or flops will do fine. Fancy clothes? Not needed here; you're on one of the Caribbean's least glitzy islands.

The littler of the two sisters that make up the Republic of Trinidad & Tobago sits just off the coast of Venezuela and is less than 120 square miles. You can drive around the island in a day, even if you stop to marvel

at the views in its hilly northern half, where each palm-fringed bay seems lovelier than the last.

Getting Around

Renting a car gives you the most freedom, but be aware that roads can be steep and winding. Taxis are available, or you can book a tour. A boat tour is another good option especially in a glass-bottomed boat.

Beach Time

Pigeon Point is the headquarters of Tobago Waterholics, one of many companies offering deep-sea fishing, dive trips to the famous Buccoo Reef and boat tours. Along the way you'll see countless pelicans and maybe spot dolphins and giant leatherback sea turtles. Pigeon Point Road; 868-688-7669; tobagowaterholics.com;



Into the Wild

When you book an Off-Road Safari with Tobago Now, your guide will probably be the irrepressible Fabrizio Ceppi, of Swiss-Italian heritage. To Market, to Market

Scarborough, the capital, won't require a long visit. But the market is worth seeing, especially on a busy Friday or Saturday. While you're in the vicinity, keep an eye out for locals lining up beside a food truck. They're probably waiting for doubles, and you should too. These are East Indian sandwiches consisting of hot, fluffy fried

bread wrapped around a filling of channa (curried chick peas) and doused with chutney and hot sauce. It's the fast-food snack that's satisfying at any hour (and costs less than \$1 a piece).

Just outside Scarborough is Fort King George, built in the 1770s by the British. Its museum offers an overview of island history and well worth a visit. Admission is about 90 cents.

Time to Spare

The capital of South Korea, Seoul, is a fascinating mix of the old and the new: from the Buddhist temples and palaces to the fashion runways of downtown.

Seoul is one of the most popular tourist destinations and it is packed with traditional markets, high end labels, cutting edge shopping and some great bargains. So wear comfortable shoes, put on a smile, bring your money and let's go shopping.



Myeongdong If you love fashion and style you are in for a treat.

Megeongdong is the centre of shopping in Seoul consisting of over 300,000 square meters of pure shopping. Here you will find big brand names such as Zara, the fashion giant UNIQLO, H&M and Nike. Migliore Mall is a major draw card for visitors and shoppers. There is easy access to it's stores through various subway connections and it is regarded as the shopping district for the 5 to 20+ age group. Teenagers tend to flock here, as there is entertainment and a great Food

Hall on level seven. There are so many shops here, and many sell unique self-designed clothes, bags and shoes. Plus it has the famous Lotte Department store with several floors of duty free shopping where you buy hands free and pick up at the airport later. Some shops have prices on them but many don't so get ready to bargain, it's all part of the fun.

Dongdaemun This is a mega shopping experience where you can shop all day and shop all night. There are a number of large buildings and there is







shopping inside and outside the buildings. Many shops specialise in Korean made fashion and you will no doubt find yourself in shopper's paradise with over 26 malls to wander through. One of the best things about Dongdaemun is the night markets. The vendors setup around 9pm and you can shop until the sun rises. This really is shopping utopia! This is also a fantastic place to try out some local cuisine.

Apgujeong One of the wealthiest areas in Seoul, Apgujeong is where all the high end fashionistas hangout. Name brands such as Louis Vuitton, Prada and Channel have setup their main shops here. There's also the Galleria Department Store, housing top line fashion labels. If you love high end shopping, and people watching you'll be in seventh heaven. Despite the high end shops there are also plenty of affordable, yet trendy shops to check out as well, so don't be too scared off by all the luxury.

Itaewon Famous for its custom tailored suits, Itaewon is well worth paying a visit. This area is renowned for providing excellent quality at great prices. The price of a tailored, custom designed suit starts as little as \$200 and most tailors speak English. There is also plenty of the hip-hop fashion and general clothing plus the street shopping is awesome.

Garosugil One of the newest hotspots in Seoul Garosugil has some of the latest global trends and fashion. Keep in mind when its cutting edge the price can be pretty expensive so best shop sparingly. 



The oldest Sydney pubs lie in the waterfront district called the Rocks, where the British first landed, in 1788, to establish Australia as a penal colony. It wasn't long before visitors were shocked by the proliferation of 'grog shops'; rum was even legal tender for a spell. Those wild days can best be imagined at the Hero of Waterloo, built in 1843 from sandstone blocks that convicts had carved by hand. In the barracks style interior, ale is served beneath a portrait of the Duke of Wellington. If the publican is in the right mood, you may even be offered a tour of the ancient cellar, one room of which once doubled as a lockup for securing prisoners after hours and who's tunnel was used to spirit involuntarily recruited sallies to the dock.

3 Lord Nelson

Australians were once ashamed of their convict past, but now embrace it with pride. The lively Lord Nelson, in the Rocks, prominently displays a framed passenger list from the first fleet of ships bringing prisoners to Sydney, in 1788, and many a customer has eagerly searched it for family names. The 1841 stone pub has been renovated into a posh, comfortable establishment with a microbrewery; try the dark porter called Nelson's Blood, along with a range of ales. The kitchen serves fresh 'damper' (campfirebaked bread that was a staple of pioneer life); modern Australian delicacies, with fresh crab and chili; and the quintessential Sydney pub lunch - beer battered catch of the day (fish).






4 East Village

Sydney's pub culture lost its respectability in 1916, when a riot by World War I soldiers led to laws that forced all bars to close at 6pm. In the 1920's Sydney workers finishing at 5pm would try to drink as much beer as they could before closing time - a rite referred to as the six o'clock closing swill. As in Prohibition era America, criminal gangs became involved in 'sly grogging' (bootlegging) and many pubs were frequented by thugs and prostitutes. Today the era's shadiest pub, the Tradesman's Arms, has been renamed the East Village Hotel, and its trendy ambiance could not be further from its wicked past. A complete renovation has revealed an airy art deco dining room and a rooftop bar. Few remember that Tilly Devine, a notorious Sydney madam, once managed her empire of 30 brothels from a bar stool here.

5 Exchange

Many Victorian pubs were graced with wrought iron balconies referred to as iron lace. The majestic three story Exchange Hotel still presides in the harbor front neighborhood of Balmain, easily reached from the city centre aboard one of Sydney's yellow and green public ferries. As it has a pub on almost every corner, Balmain is ideal for a pub crawl, with the Exchange as its pleasant ultimate goal. The affection of generations of locals for the heritage listed edifice has not been dimmed by its latest renovation. The pub now has a chic upstairs bistro with a breezy veranda whose upholstered banquettes may be the perfect place to while away a summer evening.

Built for dockworkers high in Millers Point in 1913, this charming pub is another with an improbable gangland past. In 1956 for example, a certain John William Manners was shot dead on the doorstep before the eyes of patrons. Inside, the original salon style doors and etched signage evoke a century of memories. But these days, the young professionals thronging the outdoor seating every night are more focused on which gourmet pizza to order. The pub's Aussie/Asian fusion selection is famous. Among the topping are kangaroo, babecued tiger prawn, and saltwater crocodile marinated in Thai herbs and a spicy coconut broth.

Watsons Bay

Sydney-siders know that you don't have to leave the city to get to the beach. The Harbour has dozens of sandy coves, and one of the first to become popular with daytrippers was Watsons Bay, near South Head, the spectacular sandstone bluff that frames the Harbour's entrance. The newly renovated Watsons Bay Boutique Hotel has been an added attraction since 1937. The venue has just undergone a multimillion dollar refurb and is ready to entertain! The Beach Club is a large outdoor

space perched right on the water's edge and remains Sydney's favourite place for fresh seafood served up with sweeping sunset views of the city skyline. Sip on an island inspired rum cocktail and watch the boats go by or try your luck at a game of ping pong or shuffle board.

Harbour View

For the best pub view in town, visit the sleek cocktail veranda of the beautifully renovated Harbour View Hotel. The perspective of the massive iron bridge, as it soars across the blue

sky, could not be more dramatic. While you sample the famed Sydney rock oysters and chilled sauvignon blanc, you can wave to the teams of nervous climbers heading off with safety ropes to ascend via internal stairs to the very summit of the bridge. If you're tempted to joining them, note that the climb is best made sober.





And Devon now has another big foodie draw: Plymouth. This up-and-coming coastal city has become a celebrity chef restaurant hotspot, with diners able to choose from Hugh Fearnly-Whittingstall, James and Chris Tanner, Gary Rhodes, Mitch Tonks and Anton Piotrowski. So if food is your thing then be prepared for some gastronomic courses that are sure to ignite your palate.



The sights Colourful fishing boats on long streches of pebbled beaches are a sight throughout Devon; Polperro fishing village in England's South West; Dartmouth Castle guards the entrance to the Dart Estuary.

PLYMOUTH is one of the most lively and captivating locations to visit in Devon. With its rich maritime heritage and its status as the regional capital for culture. If you're a nautical enthusiast, then be sure to make a trip to Plymouth Hoe. This is one of the most beautiful natural harbours in the world. If you are willing to climb 93 steps up Smeaton's Tower you can get fantastic views of Plymouth. Or if that sounds too hard you can hop on the Wheel of Plymouth. Also set against the backdrop of Plymouth's picturesque harbour is Barbican, a bustling collection of specialist shops, cafes, restaurants, and world-class attractions in Devon. In addition, there's Sutton Harbour, where you can visit the world-famous Plymouth Gin Distillery or drop in on the National Marine Aquarium.

CLOVELLY clings to a steep 400ft cliff where donkeys were once used to transport people and goods up the steep cobbled streets. The Quay (stone platform for unloading and loading ships) here dates back to the 14th Century and has a great deal of smuggling and pirate history associated with it. This picture-postcard, once bustling fishing village has kept its original charms. Colourful, flower bedecked cottages line the steep cobbled streets (where traffic is banned) and lead down to the ancient harbour below. High Street in Clovelly is steep and can be slippery - so do

wear sensible footwear. If you walk down you can take the fare-paying Land Rover service back to the top. Your entrance fee to the village covers an audio-visual programme introducing you to Clovelly's fascinating history, two museums – the Kingsley Museum and the Fisherman's Cottage, Clovelly Court Gardens and Parking. It's good to know that a substantial part of your fee contributes to Clovelly's ongoing restoration and maintenance program. Adult: \$11 Child: \$7 (ages 7 to 16) Family: \$29 (2 adults, 2 children).

DARTMOUTH is home to Dartmouth Castle, one of the most beautifully located fortresses in England. For over 600 years Dartmouth Castle has guarded the narrow entrance to the Dart Estuary and the busy, vibrant port of Dartmouth. Climb to the top for dramatic views across the estuary and see how it could be blocked in wartime by a heavy chain. There's also plenty to do inside the castle and if the weather is fine, you can make it a full day out with a riverboat trip from the town quay up to the castle, landing you a minute's walk away from the castle entrance. After you have explored the castle, there is a riverside tearoom with light lunches and snacks. Entry: Adult \$8.60, Child (5-15 years) \$5.20, Concession \$7.80 and Family \$22.30.

HISTORIC HOUSES



Hartland Abbey is a fascinating house. Built across a narrow, wooded valley leading to an Atlantic cove, Henry VIII gifted the Abbey to The Keeper of his Wine Cellar, whose descendants live here today. Experience not only the stunning interiors, collections, beautiful gardens and walks but also the warmth and friendliness only found in a family home cherished for generations.



Arlington Court is an unexpected jewel: a complete family estate. The intimate Regency house contains treasures for all tastes, from model ships to shells, all collected by the Chichesters. Offering incident and contrast, the 19th-century picturesque garden is a perfect place to explore, picnic or play. There are working horses and carriage rides to keep the story alive.

English Cream Tea

he cream tea is considered the regional dish of Devon. Today Devonshire Tea has been adopted with varied recipes around the world in many tourist regions. However, the traditional scone is made from just a few ingredients and things that you would normally find on a farm. That's how scones with clotted cream and jam originally come from farms. So the best place to savour your scones is Devon, but if you can't get there yet, try out our simple recipes.

SCONES

Makes 12

Best served warm from the oven (if hot the cream slides off) and should be eaten on the day.

Oven temperature: 220 °C preheat Cooking time: 10-15 minutes Cooking utensil: greased oven tray

Ingredients

2 cups self raising flour ¼ teaspoon salt 1 tablespoon of butter ¾ cup milk

Method

- 1 Collect ingredients
- 2 Rub butter into flour and salt, using the fingertips
- 3 Mix into a soft dough with milk. Add additional milk if required
- 4 Turn on to a lightly floured board and knead until smooth and elastic
- 5 Roll out 2cm thick and cut into shapes using a cutter or knife
- 6 Arrange on oven tray and glaze tops with milk using a pastry brush
- 7 Place in oven above the centre and bake until golden brown. To test, the sides of the scone should be set
- 8 Lift onto a cake cooler
- 9 While still warm break in half and serve with clotted cream and strawberry jam and a pot of tea.



QUICK STRAWBERRY JAM

Makes ¾ to 1 cup Refrigerate for up to 10 days or freeze for longer storage.

Ingredients

2 cups strawberries, hulled 1/4 cup sugar 1 Tbsp. lemon juice

Method

- 1 Place the strawberries in a food processor or blender and process until smooth or chunky, whichever way you like
- 2 Put strawberries, sugar and lemon juice into a non-stick skillet and bring to a boil over medium-high heat
- 3 Let boil rapidly until reduced and thickened, approximately 10 minutes Pour into a jar and allow to cool to room temperature before covering and storing in the fridge

CLOTTED CREAM

Makes 2 ½ cups (Refrigerate for up to 5 days)

Ingredients

2 cups (500ml) pure cream

Method

Stir cream until smooth and pour into a shallow ovenproof dish. Place dish in a water bath on the lowest shelf of the oven and bake at 100 degrees for about 6 hours. Refrigerate the cream until chilled and set. Use as required.



Visiting Old Goa is quite the experience and one feels totally transported back in time wandering around its corridors and by-lanes.

Goa has some of the best and oldest churches - so make a point of visiting a shrine or two during your holiday and appreciate the culture and architecture. The Basilica of Bom Jesus, located in Old Goa is a UNESCO World Heritage site. Containing the tomb and mortal remains of St Francis Xavier, this 3-tiered structure of Doric, Corinthian and Composite styles is a must visit for firsttimers! Mary Immaculate Conception Church in Panjim is also an intriguing piece of architecture. When visiting South Goa a must visit is a trip to the Church of St. Alex this is the oldest church in GOA and the first chapel church situated on the banks of the Angoddi Tollem Lake.

BEACHES

Goa has endless beaches including Palolem Beach one of the worlds top beaches,

located in South Goa. North Beaches steal the limelight but the South beaches can be calmer and beautiful. Asvern Beach and Calangute Beach are both in North Goa. Dotted with shacks and lounges be prepared to kick back with a Mojito or Pina Colada. Among the exotic beaches of South Goa Arassim Beach and Utordo Beach are also very popular. If you are after peace and quiet, Aganda Beach is well worth a visit. It is unspoiled and untouched by fisherman and tourists with a serene beach setting located near the town of Maordo.

If you plan your trip to Ashwem anywhere in between September to February don't forget to check out the Olive Ridley turtles. Ashwem is the nesting place for this rare species of turtles.

WATER SPORTS

Goan beaches are filled with water sport opportunities including water skiing, jet skiing, scuba diving, banana boat or take a sunset/moonlight boat cruise along the

Mandovi River. You might be lucky enough to do some dolphin spotting while you are enjoying your cruise.

TOUR THE SPICE PLANTATION

Visit the Spice Plantation in Ponda area called Sahakari Spice Plantation. This hidden gem is the largest spice plantation in the region. There are regular tours so you can learn about the different spices including Peri Peri (hottest chilies in the world). You will be welcomed in a traditional way by offering Aarti, Kumkum, and a garland of flowers. Then you will be served with herbal team. Enjoy a healthy and nutritious Goan lunch, served in the traditional manner on a banana leaf.

SPLASH WITH THE ELEPHANTS

A fun thing to do when visiting Goa is to bath an elephant. The Tropical Spice Plantation will not only give you a traditional cultural and history tour but you will be treated to an amazing experience with their gentle giants (elephants).

You can enjoy a brief ride on an elephant but the best fun is the elephant bath. The elephants are in the water and you get to wade in and climb on their backs and soon you will be enjoying a bath with the elephants. Be prepared to have lots of laughter and get drenched. You can spend as much time as you want with the elephants and feed them as well. It will no doubt be a memorable experience and a highlight of your holiday.

SHOPPING SPREE

Ingo's Saturday Night Bazaar in Apara is a must. Here you will find hundreds of vendor stalls selling beads and jewelry, clothing, stoner paraphernalia and music. Even if you are not a big shopper, this is a fun place to go, as there is plenty of nightlife entertainment including jugglers, live musicians and plenty of food. The street shops are also popular, situated in the cities of Baga and Calangute. You can expect to find souvenirs, sarongs, swimwear, jholas (colourful trendy bags), and beads. Plus most beaches have vendors

touting their wares, but stay firm with what you want and your price as they are known to be a bit pushy.

RELAX

While in Goa take time out and enjoy some pampering. There are many Ayurvedic/Ayurveda centres in Goa, which allow the ancient healing and medicines to distress and reenergize. Ayu means life and Veda means knowledge, and so Ayurveda is often referred to as the "Science of Life". Treat your senses to a transcendent atmosphere with a perfect balance of physical and spiritual wellness. The Balinese Massage at Snip Salon and Spa is located on the main road between Calangute and Candolim. Try their aromatic massage where you will drift away as you blissfully retreat from the cares of the world. www.snip.co.in

HOW TO GET THERE

Dabolim Airport, the sole airport of Goa is the nearest airport to the state. This civilian cum military airport connects the place to both national as well as international destinations. Flights to Goa are frequent and well connected to all the corners of India. The airport is owned by the Indian Navy and is 30 kms away from Panaji.

GETTING AROUND

Travelling around Goa is fairly easy. There is an extensive road network, which connects most places in Goa.

By Bus: There are private as well as state transport corporation run bus services which service all the major locations. Despite the overcrowding, noise and off-schedule service, there is a special charm in travelling in the private buses which are brightly painted and filled with colourful local characters.

By Car: A number of companies offer rental cars, both self and chauffeur-driven. Besides rented cars, there are the ubiquitous tourist taxis, which are available near most hotels and resorts and at all the tourist

attractions. There are two types of taxis, the white-colored tourist taxis, and the yellow-topped black regular taxis. Almost all major towns and tourist attractions have a taxi stand, where both types of taxis are available. Most hotels also arrange a taxi for you on request. Ensure that you fix a price for the entire journey before you sit in, so that you don't get overcharged at the end of the trip

By Motorcycle: Goa has a unique and very popular mode of transport known as a 'pilot'. This is in reality a motorcycle taxi. The motorcycle taxis are easily recognised by the yellow mudguards and yellow number plates. The driver who is known as the 'pilot' carries only one pillion rider at a time. Bargain with the pilot for a good rate for the trip before you set out.

Another great way to see Goa is to hire a Vespa (scooter/motorized bike). It's the best way to explore the numerous roads and tracks, which will take you out into the villages and farming area. Scooters or motorbikes for rent are available in the main street on all popular Goa beaches. Scooters or motorbikes that are legally registered for hire have Black/Yellow, tourist vehicle and number plates.

By Auto-rickshaw: The three-wheeled auto-rickshaw taxi, painted yellow and black, is a common site in all Goan towns. This taxi is basically the front half of a motor scooter with a couple of seats mounted on the back. They usually take two to three passengers and are quite speedy on the crowded roads of Goan towns. Above all, they are very cheap as compared to taxis for travelling around the town.




66 Recently we had the pleasure of staying at our favourite resort, Nepean Country Club in Rosebud Victoria.

ISLAND PALMS RESORT

Re-Paint Project

Each levy year, at Island Palms Resort, we budget for a major refurbishment project, and most of them require a lot of know-how and labour by Resort co-manager, John. This year the resort exterior will be repainted (last done in 1995) and it's certainly no job for John! Obviously, it is a job that needed to be timed to avoid our humid tropical months. The contractors expect the job to take approximately 4 weeks and work is due to commence 5.8.2013.

Island Palms Resort has always worked to a 10 Year Plan for refurbishment and for the current levy year, we had already secured approximations of cost in time for our May 2013 budget meeting. We approached two island painting companies and one mainland (Townsville) company. We only approached Island companies who had large enough staff numbers to tackle our job. We also knew that there could be an issue with Island companies being able to access or affordably quote for the inclusion of scaffolding and a cherry-picker to access our 10 meter building.

In typical 'island' style, only one island company quoted. After 10 years of managing Island Palms Resort, we also know we were lucky to find a mainland company that was willing to quote. Historically, town companies state it is not worth the effort travelling to the island for work, mostly due to the freight/ferry costs. Our Board of Directors opted to accept the quote offered by the Townsville company. That long established company offers a broad range of property maintenance services throughout Australia and New Zealand. Our project's expense will be paid off over a 7 year contract versus a once in-full payment. In addition, the contract involves a full external painted surface wash down annually for the subsequent 6 years, along with repair to any damaged/scuffed external paintwork. This staged payment plan will greatly benefit our cash flow for this not insignificant expense.

Now we're sure you're wondering about colours ... so are we! It's been the biggest challenge of all (nearly the end of a successful management team, let alone a 33 year marriage!). Since 1995 the resort has been one colour - a very pale blue/green. We sought a professional recommendation from an Interior Designer who is very

familiar with our property. We have had the designer's colour board in Reception for several months, welcoming comments, along with a variety of test colour 'splodges' on various parts of the resort building ... there's nothing like seeing it in situ. The bottom line is with so many varying personal preferences; we continued to be guided by a design specialist.

We had to work our way through a number of colour concepts. Rather than refreshing the building with a single colour, we considered a three colour concept. We whittled choices down to two concepts. All our 12 apartments face the same way - when you look at the building front on there are 8 'faces', so we will use accent colours on 4 of the 8 'faces' to add interest and depth. One concept picked up on our backdrop of granite rocks and profusion of palm trees, offering two accent colours of charcoal and chartreuse, to work in with a

neutral of a sand colour. It was a very dramatic, vibrant change, which resulted in "love it" or "hate it" feedback, nothing in-between. The second concept offered accent colours of a dark blue-grey and grey-raw umber, again with a neutral of a sand colour. The latter has been selected, as it was far less controversial yet very smart and modern.

It's a very exciting event for Island Palms Resort owners, and the colour scheme make-over will bring our 30 year old property up with current trends and enhance our island resort ambience.

MARINER SHORES RESORT Refurbishment



Mariner Shores Resort will close for approximately one month in November this year due to the need for refurbishment of many public areas throughout the resort and for the substantial upgrade of the outdoor pool and surrounds.

We have been working on these projects for some time and have conducted a trial Tile Removal on the public walkways in front of Units 11, 12 & 14. A couple of finishes have been trialed and none were deemed acceptable, but the majority agrees that a "flake" finish will provide a suitable result. Part of this learning process has been the discovery that the terracotta tiles are expanding and contracting with the heat and this has allowed water/moisture to remain under the tiles, effectively leaving the bottom of the steel door frames sitting in water, hence why they have rusted from the ground up. Further we have now found that we can replace the steel frames with specially coated timber frames and still remain fire compliant. Needless to say any metal we can remove from the resort is less metal to rust.

We are proposing to also replace the front

door to each unit as part of this upgrade, non fire doors will become 1200mm wide with glass inserts, Fire Door will appear to be solid timber doors. Skirting around the bottom of all walkways will also be replaced. Please note, we aim to do the Norfolk building and the lower 4 floors of the towers during this closure (these are the worst areas), the remaining 5 floors of the towers will be addressed as soon as possible in the future.

The other item on the agenda for the closure is the upgrade of the outdoor pool and surrounding areas. We will remove the two old domestic spas and replace them with one larger commercial spa, on a new raised deck that will be the same level as the BBQ Area. The Putt Putt course will be moved to the area beside this and will extend down the northern side of the tower building. An under cover, wheel chair compliant, access ramp will be installed from the games room to the rear towers.

A small viewing platform will be created slightly higher than the outdoor pool, with a wheel chair ramp created within the pool. Additionally a toddlers pool will also be

created within the outdoor pool.

To finish the family area we intend to add a "Spray Park" aimed at children aged 1 to 6 years old.

The large stair case from the games room to the pool will be replaced and the stairs from Reception re-modeled to make them more user friendly. Additionally we are addressing some of the known structural concerns in the concrete substrate of the resort.

The best part of this news is that the resort will fund the entire upgrades from existing reserves and therefore there will be no special levies. Cutting Through the Jargon....

Timeshare

Timeshare is a form of holiday ownership. You own the right (either directly or through a "club") to use a week (or longer) in resort accommodation for a set period of time.

Also known as "holiday ownership", "your week", "shared ownership"

Affilliated resort

A resort which has been entered into a current business agreement with RCI.

Also known as "partner", "associate", "resort"

Developer

The company owning the freehold of the resort; who construct the accommodation and leisure facilities. They may also employ a management company to run the resort.

Also known as "resort", "affiliate", "management company"

Deposit

Deposit your week with RCI to exchange for another week of comparable value.

Also known as "bank", "spacebank"

Deposit window

The 24-month period in which members may deposit their week(s).

Also known as "reservation window"

Holiday

Exchange your week to go to another resort in another destination.

Also known as "swap", "vacation, "exchange"

Bonus Week

Week long holidays at RCI-affiliated resorts which you book with cash.

Also known as "extra holiday", "cash booking", "rental"



We know how confusing some terms can be, that's why we've included this guide to help it all make sense.



Deposit Trading Power

When you deposit your week, RCI assigns it a trading power, known as Deposit Trading Power.

Also known as "DTP", "credit", "currency", "value of your week"

Exchange Trading Power

Every option in the RCI exchange system is assigned trading power, known as Exchange Trading Power.

Also known as "ETP", "exchange value", "value of your exchange"

Combine your Deposit

Combine your deposits or Deposit Credit so that you can exchange for a holiday that has greater trading power than your deposited week.

Also known as "bundle your weeks", "join your weeks", "mix your weeks"

Deposit Credit

If the trading power of your Exchange Holiday is less than the trading power of the weeks you have deposited, you will receive a Deposit Credit that can be used (or combined) towards a future Exchange Holiday.

Also known as "change back", "credit", "change"

Fixed Week

You own a week of timeshare at an RCI-affiliated resort that does not change every year.

Also known as "home week", "fixed ownership", "timeshare week"

Floating Week

You own a week of timeshare at an RCI-affiliated resort which is not fixed. You will need to contact RCI.

Also known as "floating time", "variable week", "floating deposit"

Maintenance fees

You pay maintenance fees direct to the resort to ensure general upkeep and quality of your resort and it covers everything from refurbishment of rooms and facilities to the day-to-day running costs.

Also known as "management fees", "dues", "resort fees"

Resort rating







Lake Taupo is New Zealand's largest lake, source of spectacular Huka Falls, and centre of an active volcanic region where geothermal energy bursts through the earth's thin crust. The Lake Taupo region is a sporting paradise, and destination for holiday adventures and relaxation.

PICTURE PERFECT

You will need to travel a long way to find a more pristine environment than thet occupied by Taupo, where glorius green hills meet crystal clear water.

Lake Taupo - the North Island's heart according to Māori legend - is the largest fresh water lake in Australasia. The lake was created in an ancient volcanic eruption, and the region is full of natural thermal springs and bubbling mud pools. Huka Falls, New Zealand's most visited natural attraction, are on the Waikato River just north of Lake Taupo. South of the lake, Tongariro National Park has dual World Heritage status recognising important Māori cultural and spiritual associations as well as its outstanding volcanic features.

Lake Taupo region is culturally significant for Māori, and has many examples of historic and contemporary Māori culture. Māori rock carvings, on a cliff at the southern end of Mine Bay, are an important contemporary cultural attraction. Wairakei Terraces gives another insight into Māori history and culture. The replica Māori village at the world-first man-made silica terraces has Māori carving treasures, culture performances and traditional hangi (earth oven) food. Guided tours into native forest highlight the spiritual relationship between Māori and the land, local cultural history, and New Zealand's unique flora and fauna.

Lake Taupo region is a vast playground for fishing, hiking and adventure. Tongariro River - on Lake Taupo's southern tip - is considered one of the world's best fishing spots. Private guides also take anglers to remote rivers and streams only accessible to those-in-the-know. The Tongariro is also the perfect river for first-time rafters and recreational kayakers. Tour operators offer day or overnight camping adventures along the river.

Tongariro National Park - a World Heritage Area south of Lake Taupo - is also the location of the Tongariro Crossing. The famous alpine crossing over active volcanoes is one of the world's best one-day mountain treks. Closer to Taupo, there are many forest and mountain walking tracks for all fitness levels. For adrenalin

junkies, Taupo has one of New Zealand's most spectacular bungy jumps - 47m from a cantilever platform above the Waikato river for either a 'water touch' or 'high and dry' thrill. Sky diving is another popular adventure activity that offers unique views of the volcanic landscape.
