

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

nce a city that was considered oldworldly, London today is a constantly morphing landscape where medieval architecture and Victorian classics collide with 1960s modernism and millennial slick. This stimulating blend of old and new has given a fresh buzz to the city, endowing visitors with something different every time.

With the greatest concentration of major attractions in Britain (238, to be exact), London certainly gives visitors more bang for their buck. A good way to see all the sights at a go is by taking a tour around the city. Do it against the wind on an open top bus, in the comforts of a coach tour, down the river Thames on a cruise, or by participating in a walking tour. Whichever you choose, you won't fail to be impressed by the majestic skylines, architectural wonders and sights you've seen hundreds of times on celluloid, but now in the flesh.



Sightseeing

London Eye

Visiting London without seeing the London Eye (Riverside Building, County Hall, Westminster Bridge Road) is like visiting Paris without seeing the Eiffel Tower. The second largest cathedral after St Peter's in Rome, St Paul's Cathedral (St Paul's Churchyard. Tel: 44 20 7236 4128) is a majestic creation that will leave you in awe.

Kensington Palace

This Palace (London, W8. Tel: 44 20 7937 9561) features the Royal Ceremonial Dress collection and beautiful 18century staterooms throughout which you could wander for hours.



Tower of London

At the Tower of London (Tower Hill. Tel: 0870 7567 070), see the Medieval Palace, the infamous Bloody Tower, and the Beauchamp Tower that bears over 90 inscriptions made by its prisoners. For the less morbid stuff, head to the Martin Tower where the Crowns and Diamonds exhibition is on display, charting the evolution of the Royal Crowns in Britain.

Westminster Abbey

Westminster Abbey (Victoria Street. Tel: 44 20 7222 5152) is an ecclesiastical architectural masterpiece of the 13th century, with its twin towers and magnificent archways. It is the church of the coronation and home to tombs of British monarchs and heroes.

The daily fruit and vegetable market is the best place in West London for fresh produce; the weekend street market sells new goods, crafts and fashions; and the pick of the bunch is the world's largest antiques market which takes place only on Saturdays.

You can't go to London and not mooch around their famous department stores. These massive, multistorey emporiums sell everything you could possibly think of. Don't miss out on **Harrod's** (87-135 Brompton Road, Knightsbridge. Tel: 44 20 7730 1234) legendary Food Halls.

Harvey Nichols (109-125 Knightsbridge. Tel: 44 20 7235 5000) is the younger, hipper cousin of Harrods and is a treasure trove of designer clothes, furnishings and posh nosh. You may even glimpse a celeb or two while shopping.

CORNWALL

Unlike the rest of Anglo Saxon England, Cornwall's roots are Celtic. It is a land of myth and legend as evidenced by standing stones or menhirs,



stone circles, and most famously, the legend of King Arthur's birth at **Tintagel**. The 13th century castle is dramatically perched on the coast. Not far away is the waterfall at **St. Nectan's Glen**. The coastal path winds its way through this area amid breathtaking views of the Atlantic Ocean and Cornish countryside.

Cornwall is also a popular destination for the nation's surfers, who enjoy some of the best conditions in Britain. Families with children shouldn't miss **Dobwalls Family Adventure Park**. Open from April to October, the Park features six steam and four diesel locomotives, a nature trail and woodland play areas. Also on offer are assorted entertainment shows and the Dobwalls Dixie Bears. Phone 01579 320325 for more information.

Getting There


Cornwall is a six-hour drive from London. For trip planning, visit www.viamichelin. com or www.theaa.com. Or fly from Gatwick airport to Newquay from around £30 (single). You will then need to hire a car unless you are going to be based in or around one of the resort towns like Newquay or St. Ives that have a fairly good public transport system in place (www.airsouthwest.com www.easyjet. com). Trains run from

London Paddington about nine times a day and take up to six hours terminating at Penzance but also stopping at Truro and Camborne (www.firstgreatwestern.co.uk).

BIRMINGHAM

Known as the "workplace of the world", Birmingham began as a small rural manor.

First mentioned in the Domesday Book as being worth 20 shillings, the town was established in 1166. Today, it is a vibrant and



cosmopolitan city, with scintillating shopping, world-class arts and culture, and the UK's finest concert venue, Symphony Hall. Go on one of the seven walking trails in the city centre that takes you through key attractions, including the NIA, The Mailbox, Millennium Point and the Bullring. Each walk guides you around the city, providing interesting nuggets of information on route regarding architecture, public art, history, heritage and quirky facts. The seven walks can be taken separately or linked together to form a comprehensive walking tour of the city. Leaflets of the Gateway Trails are available from the Tourism Centres or by calling 0870 225 0127.

Getting There

The best way to get to Birmingham from London is by train. Located in the city centre, Snow Hill and Moor Street Stations serve routes from London Marylebone (www.chilternrailways.co.uk).

MANCHESTER

Most famous for its soccer team, Manchester United, this city has plenty to offer outside Old Trafford. **The Lowry** is Manchester's latest cultural and architectural offering, with the main exhibition by L S Lowry and lots of other innovative displays by up-and-com-

ing artists that change on a regular basis. If shopping is what you're after, head to the Northern Quarter, where clothes, gifts and records are to be found under the guises of Afflecks Palace and The Coliseum empori-

ums. It's easy to get lost in the maze of stalls within these buildings, but if you're looking for something different or retro, these are a must.

Manchester also has a plethora of theatres to choose from. **The Palace Theatre** tends to show musicals while the **Opera House** does opera and ballet. For the unusual



and contemporary, head to the **Royal Exchange** and **Contact Theatre**. For music, the **Bridgewater Hall**, built to house the Hallé Orchestra, is a breathtaking building (built on springs, to boot) with a spacious and modern bar. If you're into rock and pop, the **Manchester Evening News Arena**, **Apollo** or **Manchester Academy** is where you're likely to end up, with the likes of Robbie Williams to entertain you.

Getting There

Getting to Manchester from London involves a three-hour train ride north from London Euston, or a one-hour flight from Heathrow or Gatwick airport. Check out www.britainexpress.com or call your travel agent regarding flights.

Penny-Wise, Pound-Wiser

Here's how to stretch your dollar while in London:

- Use public transport and buy the daily or weekly travelpass.
- Avoid the obvious tourist traps, usually closely associated with pop culture.
- When travelling with family, ask for family discounts. Children under 5 usually get free admission.
- Government-run or supported attractions are usually free or request a voluntary donation.
- If possible, pack your own food bought from supermarkets.
- Pound for pound, Chinese restaurants and pubs usually provide best value for money.
- For theatre or concerts, cheaper tickets may give overall better value. Buy only from the theatre itself, rather than ticket agencies which usually charge a hefty commission.

Need To Know

Climate London is cold, damp and wet in the winter. May and June usually offer the best chance of dry, sunny weather. July and August tend to be hot and humid. September and October can be pleasant too, with the added attraction of brilliant autumn colours.

Tipping In restaurants, tip 10 to 15 per cent, unless a service charge has already been added to the bill. Tipping in bars is not expected. Airport porters usually expect £1 per bag, while taxi drivers expect 10 to 15 per cent.

Taxes Value Added Tax (VAT) is 17.5 per cent in London and is almost always included in quoted prices.

Transport London is very congested and thus, not advisable to drive around in. The famous Black Cabs (Hackney Carriages) are plentiful (there are about 22,500 drivers in London), but they can be expensive for longer distances. These taxis are licensed by the police and are the only taxis allowed to legally offer their services just by stopping in the street. Mini Cabs are not licensed and not supposed to stop for you in the street. The law requires that you call them for their services. They are less expensive than Black Cabs.

The cheapest and fastest way to get around London is on the Underground, "the tube". Although it is crowded during rush hours, it is still the way to go.



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Charming Riverside Town

The trading port and ancient town of Hoi An in central Vietnam has become a highlight on any tour of Vietnam. **Rebecca Chua** finds out why.

lissfully idyllic, Hoi An boasts buildings and a pace of life that hark back to centuries past, when this small Vietnamese town was a major port of call and a springboard to the rest of the country. Intricate carvings and Japanese tiled-roofs adorn its warm buildings that date back to the earlier half of the 19th century and even before. Its narrow streets bring to mind the days of rickshaw carts while ocean-going vessels have given way to skiffs that glide languidly on its waters. In fact, so well preserved is Hoi An, that in 1999, it was declared a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

More than 2,000 years ago, Hoi An was a central port town for the Sa Huynh people. In its heyday — from 16th to late 19th century — Hoi An

was a major port of call, equal to past maritime stalwarts like Malacca and Macau. Today, its waterfront warehouses are a reminder of an era past when Japanese and Chinese traders spent up to four months in Hoi An waiting for the southerly winds to take them home.

At the end of Hoi An's harbour stands an ornate oddity next to the port city's most pragmatic houses. Hoi An's Japanese community built the bridge in 1953, believing that it would stab at the heart of a legendary monster living beneath the earth. The feisty beast was thought to cause earthquakes by lashing its tail when it was upset. On each side of the bridge is an altar of a monkey and a dog to commemorate the bridge's year of initiation and completion.

Seven Things To See And Do

Get a new wardrobe. Hoi An is central Vietnam's tailoring mecca. There are countless shops, especially along **Le Loi Street**. It's best to show the tailor a picture of the outfit you want made or bring the clothing that you'd like a copy of. The tailoring is fast (within a few hours) but the quality may not always be great so plan to have a few fittings.



To buy your own cloth, visit **Hoi An Cloth Market** (1 Tran Phu Street) and bargain hard. There are skilled cobblers on **Tran Phu Street** (near the market) who make custom shoes at affordable rates.

Shop! The abundance of shopping in this small town is amazing. As Hoi An is also a silk mecca, this is the place to buy quality silk. **Tuoingoc** (103 Tran Phu Street) sells traditional silk and lanterns. For hand-carved statues made of rock, bone, dentine and wood, check out **Le Ngoc Diep** (91 Nguyen Thai Hoc Street). For traditional-style Vietnamese furniture and artistic handicrafts, visit **Kim Bong Traditional Carpentry** along Tran Phu Street which also has art galleries, pottery and carved-wood vendors. Along the river, there are many places selling blue and white ceramics.

Visit **Central Market** early in the morning and see the locals in action. Watch all manner of poultry being sold (alive) and tied to the handles of motorbikes. At the nearby dock, fishermen unload their catch while everyone gathers round to buy it.

Learn to make lanterns from a craftsman. Contact **Hoi An Travel** (10 Tran Hung Dao Street) for a half-day or full-day session. Colourful lanterns are a big part of Hoi An culture.

Feast on seafood. Hoi An's seafood is reputed to be among the best available and best value in Vietnam. **Hoi An Hai San** (64 Bach Dang Street) is a popular seafood restaurant. If you're not a seafood fan, Hoi An has plenty of eateries serving a wide variety of food. If you have a big appetite for Vietnamese food, visit **Café Des Amis** (52 Bach Dang Street) for big portions. Kick back at **Tam Tam Café** (100 Nguyen Thai Hoc Street), Hoi An's most famous café and the only place in town that opens late (till 1am). Travellers bond here over cocktails and a game of pool, darts or scrabble.

Rent a bicycle and ride around the narrow streets of the old city. Wander among historic buildings and temples, and stop by the restaurants on **Trai Phu Street** for a cup of tea and Chinese-style pastries.

Kick back and relax on the white sand beaches of **Cua Dai**, about 5km east of Hoi An. Cua Dai beach has cheap restaurants and bars plus more salubrious venues within the



recently developed resorts and hotels. The beach is crowded with hawkers but the sand, surf and setting, with views of nearby Cham Island are worth the trip. A taxi from the town centre to Cua Dai should cost you no more than US\$4.

First-Timer's Guide To Hué

Situated on Vietnam's central coast, between Hanoi and Ho Chi Minh City, Hué is a charming city with splendid historical sights. **Graham Simmons** soaks in the sights.



Hué, a gracious metropolis of over 1 million people¹ in central Vietnam and the former Imperial capital of the country, is one of the world's finest treasures. Situated 688km from Hanoi and 1,038km from Ho Chi Minh City, Hué makes a perfect stopover for those travelling from north to south through Vietnam. A perfect stop, that is, if you can handle the atrocious weather – Hué has been known to register over 3m of rainfall in one single month.

It is the colours of Hué – that startle and amaze visitors. This gracious city takes its "passion for purple" from the colours of the Purple Forbidden City, the inner sanctum of the landmark Hué Citadel. The streets, full of people in purple plastic raincoats, are offset by houses painted in subtle shades ranging from light purple through to mauve.

The construction of the Hué Citadel took place between 1805 and 1832, after Emperor Gia Long (founder of the Nguyen Dynasty) moved the Vietnamese capital from Hanoi to Hué at the start of the 19th century. Emperor Gia Long was the first to unite the whole of Vietnam. In 1885, the French seized the city, but the Nguyen Dynasty continued as nominal rulers until the abdication of Emperor Bao Dai in 1945.

During the Vietnam-US War in the 1960s and early 70s, much of Hué was sadly destroyed. After the reunification of the country in 1975, the Herculean task of rebuilding Hué began. Reconstruction efforts received a huge boost in 1993, when UNESCO listed Hué as a World Heritage Site. Since then, Hué has become a "must-see" place for any visitor to Vietnam.

Five Ways To Enjoy Hué

Visit the Citadel of Hué

The Citadel was designed on ancient feng shui or geomantic principles, and planned around the natural elements in the area north of the Perfume River (Huong Giang). The complex faces southeast, taking Mount Ngu Binh (Royal Screen Mountain) as a sighting point. Two small islands in the Perfume River, Ta Thanh Long (Left Green Dragon) and Huu Bach Ho (Right White Tiger) serve as sentinels for the Citadel. The Emperor's throne room stuns, with layer upon layer of lacquered splendour, in shades of cobalt blue, antique red, light purple and jade green.



Take a boat trip along **Perfume River**

This is cheap, fun and a great way to get a perspective of the sights of Hué. The US\$2 fare covers the whole of the six-hour trip and many of the Imperial tombs. After sightseeing, chill out with a cup of coffee at one of the cafés on the riverbanks. Some of the world's finest Arabica coffees come from Banh Me Thuot, in the highlands south of Hué.

Visit the tombs of Nguyen Dynasty emperors

All of them are set amongst a gardenscape of bridged lakes and ponds covered with lotus blooms, with the sweet fragrances of frangipani and pine trees wafting in the breeze. You can visit the tombs as part of a boat trip (see above), although your time will be very limited.

The tomb of Emperor Tu Duc (1848-83), commemorating the longest-resigning Emperor of them all, is the most impressive of the mausoleums.

Check out the colourful entranceway to Thúông Qùôc-Hôc **High School**

The gate, in vivid shades of maroon, is a landmark of Hué. This is a school for top achievers of Hué Province. Former students include Ho Chi Minh, Pham Van Dong (the former long-ruling Prime Minister of North Vietnam), and veteran military strategist General Vo Nguyen Giap.

Visit the biennial Festival Hué

The 2006 Hué Festival focuses on reviving royal and folk performance arts, recalling the past glories of Hué. Centrepiece will be the Nam Giao procession, the re-enactment of a march honouring heaven and earth. An International Sculpture Symposium is also on the programme. Also, the spectacular Night in the Royal Palace festival, held in the Citadel, will be accentuated by the recent restoration of a crucial part of the Citadel.

While you may be too late for this year's Festival Hué (June 3-11), mark the Festival in your notebook for May-June 2008. For exact dates, visit wwww.huefestival.com.

Need To Know

HOI AN & NUÉ Visa Citizens of Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, Philippines, Singapore and Thailand can visit Vietnam as tourists without a visa, for a stay of up to 15 days. Citizens from other countries and those who want to stay longer will need to apply for a visa. Note that there is no such thing as a "visa on arrival" in Vietnam, so get yours from the Embassy of Vietnam in your home country. Visa forms may be downloaded from www.applyentryvisas.com.sg.

Currency The Vietnamese Dong (VND) is accepted everywhere. Banknotes come in denominations of 200, 500, 100, 2000, 5000, 10,000, 20,000, 50,000 and 100,000 dong. Keep a stack of smaller bills handy

Health Malaria tablets are highly recommended. In particular, take exceptional precaution against mosquito bites. Nearly 8,000 cases of dengue fever were reported from Vietnam in the first guarter of 2006, up more than 20 per cent from the same quarter in 2005. See your health professional for the most up-to-date advice. Also, vaccination against Hepatitis A is recommended.

Drinking Water Don't drink unboiled water. It is also advisable to avoid uncooked food or any cooked food that has been left standing for some time.

Weather Even during the dry season (February to June), Hué's weather is likely to be overcast or drizzling. The warmest months are June to August, with an average daily maximum temperature of 34°C. The wet season (September to December) is not the best time to visit Hué as average monthly rainfall is between 45 and 70cm.

What To Pack Bring a raincoat and/or umbrella. Apart from this, light tropical clothing should suffice unless you are planning to visit the nearby Annam Highlands (including Dalat). The nights here can get very chilly in the cooler months (November to February).

Getting There From Hanoi or Ho Chi Minh City, you can get to Hué either by train or air, or (if you're a masochist) by bus.

• By Rail Trains from Hanoi take between 10½ and 15¾ hours, costing US\$23-28 for a sleeper (recommended). From Ho Chi Minh City, the train journey is between 201/2 to 24 hours, costing US\$29-39.

• By Air Regular air services (three or more flights a day) on Vietnam Airlines link Hué with Hanoi and Ho Chi Minh City. If you are not flying via Vietnam Airlines, it's best to buy your connecting flight ticket to Hué locally (cost - approximately US\$50). Flight time is about one h our.

Agnes Wee recommends 10 fun things to do during spring in South Korea's capital and largest city.

Spring (March to May) is a good time to visit Seoul as beautiful flowers like azaleas, forsythias and cherry blossoms are in bloom, offering lovely sights to behold. This is also the time when major theme parks such as Lotte World and Everland hold several flower festivals.

Han River Cruise

Take a leisurely cruise on the **Han River Pleasure Boat** and admire the scenic skyline of Seoul from the **Han River**. The scene is especially breathtaking during sunset. Prices vary for one-way and round trips. You can also have a choice of buffet spread accompanied by "live" music.

👝 Palace Visit

2 If you appreciate historical architecture, a visit to the wellpreserved ancient royal palaces is a must. Choose from **Deoksugung Palace, Changdeokgung Pal**- ace, Changgyeonggung Palace and Gyeongbokgung Palace, Seoul's main royal palace. In spring, the palace grounds, with its blooming flowers, are a beautiful sight to behold. While you are around the palace vicinity, do drop by the present presidential residence, also known as the Blue House probably named for its blue-coloured roof.

One of the best places to have a spectacular view of the spring blossoms is **Seoul Tower**, touted to be the world's third highest tower at 480m above sea level. It's located at the top of **Mount Namsan** and you can choose to walk or take the cable car to reach the top.

Also check out **Myeongdong**, the fashion district in Seoul for the latest fashion, and **Itaewon** where most of the retailers and shop owners speak English.

Outdoor Sports

For those who love the great outdoors, there are sporting tours that include horse riding, bungee jumping, rafting, hiking and trekking. Check with your hotel or the local travel agencies for details on tours and activity packages.

7 Spa

Pamper yourself with an indulgent spa treatment after all that walking while sightseeing and shopping. There is no lack of spa outlets, hot springs and bathhouses in Seoul. Popular tourist areas like **Itaewon** and **Myeongdong** even have bathhouses for women only.

Need To Know

Visa Tourists who are visiting for up to 30 days do not require a visa.

Weather Spring and autumn are the best times to visit Seoul as the temperature is mild, and the natural beauty of cherry blossoms in spring and falling leaves in autumn lend a romantic touch.

Transport The public transport system in Seoul is very efficient and convenient, so travelling free and easy is no sweat. But make sure you are armed with a local map to get from place to place. Don't bother asking for directions unless you speak Korean as you are likely to get replies in Korean.

Currency The Korean currency is won, which comes in 1000, 5000 and 10,000 won notes. Credit cards like Visa, Master Card and American Express are accepted at most major hotels, restaurants, department stores and some big retail outlets.

Tipping This is not customary in Korea, but some high-end restaurants and hotels may add a 10 per cent service charge to your bill.

Language Most Koreans, even the younger people, do not speak English or Mandarin. Communication may be a problem, so arm yourself with maps, a calculator and a trusty travel guide. When ordering food in small, family-run eateries, point your orders on the menu which usually has pictures of the dishes.


If you love conquering heights, you will enjoy the hike up **Mount Sorak**, home to 939 species of plants and 25 different mammals. For a more sedentary experience, catch a cable car ride to the top of **Kwonkum-seong** where you'll find a castle offering a bird's-eye view of the valleys and even a

grotto hermitage, where famous Korean monks were said to have stayed and practiced ascetism.

Jeju Island

Just off the southern tip of Korea, Jeju is Korea's largest island and nature's playground. Often called the Island of Gods, Jeju has scenic beaches, waterfalls, cliffs and caves, superior tourist amenities and pleasant weather.

Towering above the landscape is **Mount Hallasan**, South Korea's highest mountain. There

are numerous hiking trails to the summit but be prepared for a long (but not arduous) climb. The crisp, clear air and the sea of flowers along the course are just teasers to the astounding view you get at the top.

The three waterfalls in Jeju (Jeongbang, Cheonjeyeon and Cheonjiyeon) are made of myths – literally. Legend has it that one of them got its name from the seven nymphs who assisted the King of Heaven to bath and play in the waters during nightfall. whole young chicken is stuffed with rich ingredients such as glutinous rice, garlic, chestnuts and other nutritious herbs, then boiled in a thick broth for many hours.



Bibimbap

• *Bibimbap* A common and colourful Korean dish which comprises rice mixed with different kinds of vegetables, beef strips, eggs with a dose of sesame oil, and a pinch of chili and pepper thrown in for extra flavours.

• *Mandu* Korean-style dumplings that can be eaten as a side dish or main dish with rice. It's made of fresh beancurd, ground beef or shredded pork, and minced mixed vegetables which are sealed in kneaded wheat dumpling skin and then deep fried, steamed or boiled in a soup with vegetables and rice cakes.

Winter Fun in Lake Tahoe

In winter, Lake Tahoe is a fun playground offering plenty of activities and worldclass skiing for both beginners and experts. **Mary Ellen Hickey** shares the best places to ski and have fun.

restled in the Sierra Nevada Mountains, sapphire blue Lake Tahoe is one of America's favorite places to ski. As the largest alpine lake in North America, it straddles two states - California and Nevada. The majority of its 15 downhill ski resorts reside in California while the Nevada side is known for its high-rise casinos.

The ski areas range from mammoth first-class facilities to smaller, friendly "mom-and-pop" operations with fewer frills that are less overwhelming for beginners. Each small community along its 115km shoreline has a distinct persona, including the two main towns – the north shore's more modest and historic Tahoe City versus the shopping and entertainment capital of South Lake Tahoe (SLT).

Where To Ski

South Shore

The king of the south Tahoe ski scene, Heavenly Lake Tahoe, is one of North America's larg-

est ski areas. Experienced skiers and snowboarders love it for its firstrate facilities, tree skiing, the longest ski run (8.8km) and largest superpipe in Tahoe. Non-skiers enjoy the ride 915m up the aerial tram to soak in spectacular lake views and have lunch on the sprawling out-

door deck. At least 12 RCI resorts including Lake Tahoe Vacation Resort are within 3.2km or even walking distance of Heavenly's slopes.

Although a 30- to 50-minute drive from SLT, two other ski areas offer less glitz, better value and plenty of top-notch amenities - Sierra-at-Tahoe (snowboarders' favorite) and Kirkwood (home to a top-ranked learn-to-ski programme).

North Shore

Squaw Valley, home of the 1960 Winter Olympics, is the premier north shore ski area. Along with worldclass skiing, its "High Camp" at the top of the 610m aerial cable car is a mountain-top retreat loved by non-skiers, complete with a sledding park, a huge heated swimming pool,

a 25-person Jacuzzi, an Olympic museum and a cliff-hugging ice skating ring with panoramic lake views.

Within walking distance to the gondola or ski lifts are RCI resorts Olympic Village Inn and Squaw Valley Lodge. Diamond Peak at Incline Village, a relaxed, mid-sized and less crowded familyoriented ski area, hosts innovative programmes for kids aged 4 to 12, plus a

unique après-ski wine tasting event called "Last Tracks" every Saturday afternoon. Incline Village is home to RCI resorts, Club Tahoe and Tahoe Chaparral.

If you're staying on the south shore, take the world's only aqua ski shuttle (www. zephyrcove.com) for a day of skiing at Squaw Valley or Northfollowed star. bv an après-

ski party and shuttle back to SLT on board the Tahoe Queen paddlewheeler boat.



Other Outdoor Activities

Scenic Drive

If the roads and weather are clear, take a scenic drive around the lake, featuring stunning Emerald Bay, Tahoe's most photographed natural wonder.

Cruise

Relax on a two-hour cruise to the bay on the M.S. Dixie traditional paddlewheelboat (www. \mathbf{er} laketahoecruises. available com). year-round.

shoe hikes and old-fashioned horsedrawn sleigh rides are also favorites throughout the area.

Excursions

Virginia City (www. virginiacity-nv.org), well-preserved, а 19th-century "wild west" ghost town, makes a fun halfday excursion, 65km east. If cross-country skiing is more your speed, spend a day at Royal Gorge

(www.royalgorge.com). This largest and perhaps best cross-country ski area in the US, 48km west of Tahoe City, offers over 90 trails, including "Sesame Street" for children, a ski school, 10 warming huts and moonlight tours.

The North Lake Tahoe Snow Festival brings 10 days of parades, ski races



and music events in early March (www.tahoesnowfestival.com). On the "First Friday" of every month, Tahoe City's shops and galleries stay open late and celebrate with artists' receptions, wine tastings and music (www.visittahoecity.com). Check with individual ski areas for latest scheduled ski races, Christmas torchlight parades and other special events.






