Art celebrating Jeju's life and culture appeared on buildings and unexpected spaces, breathing fresh air into the area, exciting locals and travellers.

ORLANDO MUSEUM OF ART

Founded in 1924, Orlando Museum of Art (www.omart.org) has been the heart of Florida's art scene for close to 90 years. The museum is committed to the collection and preservation of great works, exhibiting art pieces of a wide variety from around the globe.

From budding artists to art enthusiasts, grown-ups to the little ones — Orlando Museum of Art offers a wide variety of creative activities to inspire and engage diverse individuals. Unlimited gallery tours, world-class enrichment programmes, art camps, lectures and studio classes are available throughout the year. The museum is open daily except on Mondays and major

holidays. Tuesdays to Fridays, 10am to 4pm. Saturdays and Sundays, noon to 4pm. Admission prices: Children and college students at SG\$4.80, adults at SG\$9.65.

WELLS' BUILT MUSEUM OF AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY AND CULTURE

The museum is an ode to Orlando's African American heritage, located in the heart of Orlando's historic Parramore district (511 West South Street). Originally known as Wells' Built Hotel, the 1929 building served its purpose of hosting African American performers during the Segregation era. It took on its new identity as a museum only in June 2009. Exhibits include the African American community's memorabilia, artifacts from local collectors, and galleries on the Civil Rights movement in Orlando. The building was listed on the U.S. National Register of Historic Places on the 4th of February, year 2000.

BASILICA OF THE NATIONAL SHRINE OF MARY, QUEEN OF THE UNIVERSE

With the opening of Walt Disney World Resort and many other attractions in the 1970s, the Basilica of the National Shrine of Mary was built at 8300 Vineland Avenue (maryqueenoftheuniverse.org) to service its booming Catholic tourists.

This humble yet majestic Latin Rite basilica has a 2000-seat church, Rosary Garden, Mother & Child Outdoor Chapel, Blessed Sacrament Chapel and the Museum of Christian Art. It is now a tourist attraction of Orlando. Welcoming visitors from all lands, the shrine of Virgin Mary

holds choir performances, guest lectures, exhibitions and cultural activities for people of every age group.

CHURCH STREET STATION

The historic Church Street Station was constructed in 1889 by South Florida Railroad. Also known as Old Orlando Railway Depot, it has served several railroads in its heyday until passenger services were transferred to Orlando Health/Amtrak station in 1926. Located at the heart of Church Street District (127 West Church Street), the station was gradually transformed into an epicentre of restaurants, cafes and retail shops. The opening of the bustling sports and entertainment hub Amway Center (www.amwaycenter.com) breathed new life into Church Street. More hip locals and tourists congregate at the station's bars for nights of revelry.

ORLANDO EYE

One of the latest attractions creating buzz in Orlando is the Orlando Eye. As the tallest structure on South International Drive, Orlando Eye offers a refreshing way to experience the city. The 30-capsule wheel literally brings your perspective of Orlando's beauty to new heights as the biggest observatory wheel on the east coast of the USA. Aptly nicknamed 'The City Beautiful', Orlando viewed from above takes your breath away with its gorgeous skyline of theme parks, lakes and landscapes. Ticket prices start as low as SG\$19.30 for general admission, to SG\$95.60 for a combination of Orlando's top 4 attractions.

The Art of Eating an Oyster

Throwing back a half dozen oysters is easy; actually appreciating them takes a little know-how.

As true oyster lovers know, there's an art to tasting the bivalve's complex flavours. Oyster tasting is a fine art, much like wine. That means appreciating the nuances of an oyster's 'merrior'—the marine counterpart of terroir, all those environmental aspects that shape the taste of wine.

Autumn is a particularly good time to brush up on your oyster-tasting skills. While modern refrigeration and cultivation mean that you can eat oysters all year long—not just in months with an r in their names—oysters develop a deeper, richer flavour in the autumn and winter. East coast oysters build up glycogen to survive through colder months, which makes them taste sweeter and fattier; think of it as marbling in a steak.



Here's how to savour that oyster you're eating, in six sensory stages.

- 1. THE BOUQUET. Just as you do with a glass of wine, begin by inhaling the aroma of the oyster. That olfactory hit is your introduction to the flavours that make the oyster unique.
- 2. THE LIQUEUR. Sipping the 'juice' in which the oyster sits can tell you a lot about where it's from. In fact, this is where you get your first hits of salinity, minerality and earthiness. Oysters from rocky coastal areas, for instance, have a more mineral flavour.
- **3. THE FRONT.** With the oyster in your mouth, focus on the taste with the tip of your tongue. This introduces you to the initial flavour, which may then change as you eat it.
- 4. THE BODY. As you chew the actual oyster itself, concentrate on the texture as well as the flavour. Is it rich and buttery? Salty and snappy? Chewing also brings out an oyster's sweetness.

- **5. THE FINISH.** Oysters linger on the palate longer than a lot of foods. The finish is often when you taste the oyster's umami, that undercurrent of savoury flavour.
- 6. THE PAIRING. An oyster matched with the right wine or beer is like a perfect marriage. Stick with a light-bodied dry white, such as steel-aged pinot grigio or a Loire Valley muscadet (which many have called the perfect wine for oysters). For beer, think a saison ale, a session beer, a very light IPA or another low-alcohol brew that won't overpower.

Oh, and it's probably best to put away that cocktail sauce. The sweetness and strong horseradish flavour of cocktail sauce obliterate the taste of raw oysters. Rather, try a mignonette, a thin sauce typically made from shallots, cracked black pepper and champagne vinegar. With oysters, you want to accentuate, not overpower their freshness.

1 Musée d'Orsay Paris

Degas' ballerinas, van Gogh's Starry Night Over the Rhone, Cézanne's still lifes—all are on display at the premier museum of Impressionism in France, if not the world. It's located in the Beaux-Arts former Orsay railway station, across the Seine from the Tuileries Garden, and retains the station's original soaring glass ceiling and great hall. *musee-orsay.fr*

2 Getty Center Los Angeles

Clad in Italian travertine, this Richard Meier-designed complex in the hills of Los Angeles affords views stretching to the Pacific Ocean. To get here, either walk or take a tram up the steep slope from the parking lot. Within its airy pavilions you'll find Impressionist paintings by the likes of Édouard Manet and, scattered around the

estate, sculptures by such greats as Joan Miró and Isamu Noguchi. *getty.edu*

3 Metropolitan Museum of Art New York City

The Met is the largest museum in the western hemisphere, having a collection of more than 2 million items spanning antiquity to the present. More than 6 million people annually pass through its galleries. Its Egyptian collection showcases the Temple of Dendur (c. 23–c. 10 B.C.), while European paintings include works by Degas, Rembrandt and Vermeer. *metmuseum.org*

4 The National Gallery

London

Paintings from the mid-13th century to the early 20th hang on the walls of this Trafalgar Square landmark. The west wing turns the spotlight on the High Renaissance (Michelangelo, Titian and Raphael). In the east wing, 18th- and 19th-century British artists, such as Gainsborough, Constable and Turner, take centre stage. nationalgallery.org.uk

5 Tokyo National Museum

If you have time for only one museum in Tokyo, make it this one. The oldest and largest art museum in Japan holds the world's largest collection of Japanese art and archeological artifacts. Explore the three-storied, newly renovated Tőyőkan (Gallery of Eastern Antiquities), with its collection of Buddhist sculptures and Chinese ceramics from Asia. *momat.go.jp*

6 Art Institute of Chicago

Home to such paintings as Grant Wood's American Gothic, the Art Institute of Chicago is itself a masterpiece. The 1893 Beaux-Arts building is connected to a Renzo Piano-designed wing by a gallery set over railroad tracks. Inside is a collection of Impressionist and post-Impressionist art; 20th- and 21st-century works, including Edward Hopper's Nighthawks and Marc Chagall's stained-glass windows. artic.edu

7 Hagia Sophia Istanbul

One of the seven wonders of the medieval world and the greatest surviving example of Byzantine architecture, the Hagia Sophia dominates the Istanbul skyline. The emperor Justinian ordered the structure built in A.D. 532 in a bid for eternal glory. To call it grand would be an understatement: The dome is 184 feet high and 102 feet wide. To put that in perspective, the Statue of Liberty without its base could fit underneath with room to spare. Head to the upstairs galleries

to view the most intricate mosaics. ${\it ayas of yamuze si.gov.tr}$

8 National Museum of Modern and Contemporary Art

Seoi

Seoul's only national art musuem sits just across the streets from Gyeongbokgung, and showcases over 7,000 modern artworks. You don't have to be an art aficionado to enjoy the large, playful pieces on display. Enjoy free admission to all exhibits every fourth Saturday of the month. *mmca.go.kr*

Whitney Museum of American Art

New York City

This museum began in the 1930s in Greenwich Village with a collection from Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney. It would later move to West 54th Street and then to Madison Avenue. This year it found a 200,000-squarefoot home near the High Line. Among the 18,000 pieces are works by Andy Warhol and Georgia O'Keeffe. *whitney.org*

Museum of Qin Terracotta Warriors

near Xi'an, China

You could easily spend two days or more exploring the archeological wonder near China's ancient capital, Xi'an, two hours by air from Beijing. Thousands of life-size clay warriors, part of the funerary complex of China's first emperor, Qin Shi Huang, stand here to protect him in the afterlife. Historians believe that some 700,000 workers toiled on the mausoleum for more than three decades. Fun fact: Though the soldiers were crafted using molds, each has distinct facial features that were added after assembly. whc.unesco.org

RIVER CITY GLITZ

Australia's most underrated city, Brisbane has burgeoned from a sleepy river town into a shopping haven of vibrant upscale precincts and eclectic innercity suburbs. Gather a few friends, put on your best dresses and shop till you drop.











Glittering Glamour

In the heart of Brisbane is Australia's largest open-air pedestrian mall, Queen Street Mall (Queen Street, QLD 4000). This half-kilometre stretch of bustling shopping centres boasts over 700 specialty stores inaccessible by cars, an exclusive privilege for shoppers to move from mall to mall without having to dodge traffic. Luxury boutiques with the likes of Tiffany & Co. and Louis Vuitton lavishly occupy the exquisite Queens Plaza (262 Queen Street). Shop up a storm at David Jones, Queensland's largest onelocation departmental store located at Lower Ground, Ground and Level 1. Wintergarden (171-209 Queen Street) is a stone's throw away, and its nature-inspired façade holds Queenlands' only Coach store and upmarket Australian brands such as Sambag and Mecca Maxima. Home to Queensland's biggest Myer departmental store with over 180 specialty shops, The Myer Centre (91 Queen Street) is your six-storey, one-stop shopping destination. Done with shopping? Sit back and enjoy a good blockbuster movie at the eight-screen cinema at Level 3.

Indie Buzz

Affectionately called 'The Valley' by Brisbane locals, Fortitude Valley (Fortitude Valley, QLD 4006) is a bustling inner-city suburb buzzing with life. The Valley is lined with eclectic eateries and a sprinkle of art galleries, offering some of the best indie shopping to be had in Brisbane. Take a walk down the quaint narrow streets of The Valley to unveil Brisbane's favourite designers like Gail Sorronda, Easton Pearson and Pistols at Dawn. Set foot in Brunswick Street, and spot the hidden chamber shop, Fallow for a wellcurated collection of fashion buys that you won't find elsewhere in Australia. Well-loved

local designers' labels are gems to find in shops such as Ultra Suite and Blonde Venus dotting the alleys of Ann Street. A detour into Winn Street brings you into The Valley's quirky laneway featuring Tym Guitars for guitar fans, The Outpost for independent brands from around the globe, and Kunstler for small print publications. Be sure to drop by Chinatown Mall (33 Duncan Street) for exotic Chinese products, or simply slow down and luxuriate at chic bars with live bands and the occasional street theatre acts.

With rolling lush green hills, quaint

cottages and pockets of picturesque streets, Paddington (Paddington, QLD 4064) is indisputably one of Brisbane locals' favourite hangouts. Gently scratch the surface of this historical inner city to unveil a treasure trove of quirky keepsakes, retro goods, vintage fashion and antique treasures. Paddington Antique Centre (167 Latrobe Terrace) occupies an old theatre on Latrobe Terrace, attracting over 50 antique dealers locally and internationally to gather under one roof. Latrobe Terrace is also home to Green Tangerine, a proud supporter of locally designed products and Sheets on the Line, Australia's favourite organic bed liner designer. Take a walk down the hilly paths of Given Terrace and be flanked by charming neighbourhood boutiques like Paddington's retro-veteran Retro Metro and the eclectic Ra Ra Superstar for a collection of vintage pieces. Exploring like a local can take you off the beaten track and into the edgy Rosalie Village, tucked behind Paddington. Here, locals' favourite Yesterday's Thrift Shop sits in a bright red cottage, welcoming vintage hunters into its labyrinth of rooms packed with pre-loved bargains.

TRYP Fortitude Valley



The grandeur of the eagle's view from the 182m 'Sunrise Peak', 600m wide crater and 100% natural scenery must be seen to be believed.

GO UNDERGROUND

Even the depths of Jeju offer much to explore. Trek through the 2.5 million-year-old Manjanggul cave – one of the world's longest lava tunnels.

TAKE A HIKE

Whether you're a nature lover or not, the hike up Hallasan Mountain is one not to be missed, if only for the view, studded with crater lakes and vivid flora.

GLASSWORKS


The Jeju glass castle comprises of six theme parks featuring everything from labyrinths to gardens made entirely of glass.

HOME OF THE HOBBITS

Originally a quiet country town, Matamata was just another pleasant landscape to drive by in the Hamilton-Waikato region of New Zealand. But magic happened. During an aerial search for a location to film Sir Peter Jackson's multi-award winning The Lord of the Rings trilogy, Matamata was discovered.

Here, Alexander Farm owns 1,250-acre of green pastures, huge trees and a small darling lake, drawing the attention of location scout Dave Comer. That afternoon in the year of 1998, Dave negotiated with the farmer and his family, won over their hearts and began his legacy of building the Hobbiton Movie Set.

Stone buildings with quaint doors were tucked into rolling green hills, overgrown with native grasses and wildflowers. There are now 44 Hobbit holes since The Shire's rebuilding in 2010. Hobbiton resembles an idyllic 17th century English country of barberry hedges, trees with hanging apples and pears, lichen-covered fences and rugged paths.

Step into the world of J.R.R. Tolkien's The Lord of the Rings trilogy and The Hobbit, with a fascinating narration by the Movie Set Tour. The popular tour operates every half hour in the summer season. Set off from The Shires Rest Cafe, meandering through The Shire and its Hobbit holes, vegetable gardens, before going round the lake to the Party Tree and The Mill. After, enjoy a local custom-brewed beer at The Green Dragon Inn.

Opened in December 2012, The Green Dragon Inn is Hobbiton's newest addition. There are little pockets of bar areas where you can kick back with a beer in hand. Sample traditional Hobbit fare on The Green Dragon Menu – the beer and ale pie is highly recommended.

For a magical evening of revelry, explore Hobbiton at dusk and dig into a banquet dinner fit for a Hobbit. The Evening Dinner

Tour includes a stroll through Hobbiton Movie Set, with one complimentary beverage from the Hobbit Southfarthing range to be had in front of open fires. Next, be led into The Green Dragon Inn dining room for a table full of traditional Hobbit fare. The evening ends surrealistically with a moonlit walk back into the wandering paths of The Shire, illuminated along the way by pathlights and authentic handheld lanterns.

CONQUER THE FALLS

While fans of Tolkien and Sir Jackson flock to Matamata for Hobbiton, the Hamilton-Waikato region around Matamata has more to offer than meets the eye. Take a 10-minute drive from Matamata to Wairere Falls, the highest waterfall of North Island.

The Wairere Falls Track paves the way to the lower viewing platform located at the base of the falls. Leave your vehicle behind at the carpark on Goodwin Road (off Old Te Aroha Road) and begin your

hike from there. A return journey will take approximately an hour and a half.

Voyage through native forest, cross quaint wooden bridges, and take in the views of gentler, smaller cascades. Be amazed by the 153 metres, 2-stage drop Wairere Falls from the viewing platform. Cascading water breaks into little streams, flowing through mossy green rocks and ferns. Laze around on park benches or dip your toes into the refreshing cool waters.

For an even more breathtaking view, climb the rugged stairs leading to the top of Wairere Falls. Feel the world at your feet with a magnificent view overlooking the Waikato plains. The journey between the lower platform and the waterfall's peak will take an extra 2 hours.

LOOKING BACK

Built in 1882 by Auckland businessman Josiah Clifton Firth, The Firth Tower

was one of the first reinforced concrete buildings in New Zealand. In its heyday, this 16-metre structure served its purpose as a lookout point over the countryside, as an estate office and a men's sleeping quarter.

Today, the tower offers more than just an extensive view. Visit The Firth Tower and its neighbouring buildings for an array of museum displays by Matamata Historical Society. Around the tower are 10 other historic landmarks, including a church, schoolroom and jail. Outside, gardens are welcoming for leisure strolls. Huge oak trees emerge from sprawling lawns, providing cool shade for an afternoon picnic in the tranquil historic nature.www.firthtower.co.nz



At Piako Gliding Club on Matamata Airfield (State Highway 27), anyone can fly. If you are sitting in a glider for the first time, Piako Gliding Club's pilot training will first take you through a trial flight, followed by the learn-to-fly course and an advanced training course. Experienced solo pilots wishing to take a gilder on a cross-country flight can pick up skills and knowledge from the panel of professional instructors. www.glidingmatamata.co.nz

RACE & GALLOP

Situated in the heart of New Zealand's highest racehorse and breeding population, Matamata is naturally a place to watch horses race. Each morning at approximately 5am, the Matamata Racing Club gallops into life with over 500 horses out on training. The Matamata Racing Club's racecourse comprises 158 acres of grass, plough, sand and all-weather tracks, as well as an equine pool. Visitors are welcome to watch the horses in training. View majestic horses kicking up dust in the morning sunlight, with the Kaimai Ranges as backdrop — not hitting the snooze button will be worth it. Call Matamata

Racing Club at +66 7-888 8898 to ask for training schedules before visiting.

HOLE IN ONE

Golfers will relish teeing off on the rolling green Matamata pastures set against the backdrop of the gorgeous Kaimai Ranges.

Matamata Golf Club (matamatagolf.co.nz) and Walton Golf Club (waltongolf.co.nz) are two of Matamata's best courses offering the best view and facilities.

Matamata golf course offers free draining soil, which means the course is playable within minutes of even the heaviest downpour. Its variety of challenges will delight golfers of all levels. Corporate and social occasions are welcomed. The Walton Golf Club is slightly off the beaten path, meeting halfway of Matamata and Morrinsville. The club has been applauded worldwide for its wonderful hospitality and spacious clubhouse.

Both golf clubs will transform your golfing experience with their manicured fairways, fully irrigated greens and rows of lush trees.

GETTING THERE BY ROAD

Matamata is a 2-hour drive from Auckland. From Hamilton, the drive will take 45 minutes. Expect a 1-hour drive if you are departing from Rotorua.

DINING IN RECIPIES FOR RESORT MADE MEALS

IN HUNGARY, A REFRESHING SALAD GETS A DASH OF PAPRIKA.

Hungarian cucumber salad, called uborkasaláta, typically goes right alongside the main meal. The salad's bright, acidic flavours contrast perfectly with the richness of the country's traditional stews and heavily sauced dishes. The salad can be dressed up with the addition of sour cream or even a small amount of mayonnaise (especially good with fish).


What makes the dish uniquely Hungarian is the country's beloved spice, paprika. Depending on your taste, you can use sweet or hot paprika (or a combination). The good news is that the salad combines peeled cucumbers with simple ingredients, most of which are probably in your pantry.

HUNGARIAN CUCUMBER SALAD

- 2 medium cucumbers
- 1 pinch salt, plus 1 tsp
- tsp freshly ground black pepper
- 1 pinch sugar
- 1/4 cup white or apple cider vinegar
- 1/2 tsp sweet paprika (or more to taste, using a combination of sweet and hot paprikas)
- tbsp sour cream (optional)

Peel the cucumbers and slice very thin with a sharp knife or mandoline. Sprinkle with the pinch of salt, mix and place in a strainer over a bowl 30 to 45 minutes to remove excess water and concentrate cucumber flavour. In a separate bowl, whisk together the remaining salt and the pepper, sugar and vinegar. Add the cucumbers and mix well. Marinate two hours or more. To serve, place the cucumbers on a plate and sprinkle the paprika on top.

Serves 4 to 6.







Hyams Beach

Hyams Beach, Australia

Hyams Beach is said to have the whitest sand in the world. The sand is also fine and soft, ideal for sunbathing. If your vacation style is more active, the clear waters and colourful marine life provide first-rate snorkeling. The beach faces east, offering a spectacular tableau if you can get there in time for sunrise.



Muriwai Beach

Auckland, New Zealand

Pitch-black volcanic sand defines Muriwai Beach, only a 40-minute drive from Auckland. It's a favourite among white seabirds called gannets, whose cliff-top colony polka-dots the landscape. Muriwai's rolling waves make it just as popular among surfers. To join them, you can rent equipment or schedule a lesson at the nearby Muriwai Surf School.

Pink Beach

Komodo, Indonesia

One of the few pink beaches in the world is found on the island of Komodo. Green hills and turquoise water border the rosy shore. In some areas the ocean is so clear, you can make out the coral reef below. While you're there, keep an eye out for oversized Komodo dragons, lizards that take their name from the island.

Pink Sands Beach

Harbour Island, Bahamas

For a blush-tinted beach, head to the Bahamas. Although smaller, Harbour Island is much more laidback than the casino-laden Nassau, Paradise Island or Cable Beach. Winter, when the temperature settles at about 75 degrees, is an ideal time to visit. Spend your days swimming in the gentle waters and your nights feasting on conch, the local specialty.

Red Beach

Santorini, Greece

Santorini may be known for whitewashed cliff-top towns, like Fira and Oia, but its red sand beach is truly breathtaking. This natural wonder is located minutes from a man-made one, the Minoan ruins of Akrotiri. Admire the red shore from above, or walk down to experience it up close.

Ramla Bav

Gozo, Malta

Legend has it that Calypso's cave in Homer's Odyssey is one that overlooks the orange shore of Ramla Bay, on the Maltese island of Gozo. Although the cave itself isn't much to look at, the climb up to it is worth it for the panoramic view of the curved coastline it offers. The orange sand stretches long and wide, so you can find plenty of space on this popular beach to lie out in.



Papakolea Beach

Naalehu, Hawaii

Olivine lava crystals give this beach its distinctive hue. Getting there's a bit of a hike, but at the end you're rewarded with one of four green shores in the world (the others are in the Galápagos Islands, Guam and Norway). The surrounding cliffs that help isolate and protect this beach are the remains of a cinder cone that is thought to have formed 50,000 years ago.

Pfeiffer Beach

Big Sur, California

Most people head to the central California region of Big Sur for stunning views of the Santa Lucia Mountains rising from the Pacific Ocean. Pfeiffer Beach doesn't make as many travel lists, but its psychedelic purple-streaked shore is just as photoworthy. Winter storms erode the garnet cliffs that line the cove, causing the rare colour and making the cold season a preferable time to go for the full effect.

Bioluminescent Beaches

Maldives

Beaches in the Maldives sometimes glow in the dark. Certain species of plankton light up like fireflies to scare off predators, resulting in tiny blue lights that cover the shore. Although this bioluminescence has been spotted throughout the Maldives, your best bet is traveling to one of the northern islands: Mudhdhoo or Vaadhoo. If you can, go during a new moon; the darker the sky, the more impressive the illumination.

Rainbow Beach

Rainbow Beach, Australia

You can find more than 70 hues of colour in the sands of Rainbow Beach. The Kabi Kabi people, who originally lived there, believed that Yiningie, a spirit symbolised by the rainbow, fell into the surrounding cliffs during a battle, causing the patchwork dunes. The town of Rainbow Beach lies just south of Fraser Island, a World Heritage site covered in rain forests, eucalyptus trees, mangrove woodland and more.



Tateshina Highland, or 'Tateshina kogen' in Japanese, is located at northwestern slope of Yatsugatake mountains. A potpourri of sweeping panorama, lavish comforts and natural adventure, this little town is a green gem yet to be fully discovered by the outside world. Locals travel in from all over Japan to escape into the heart of nature — waking up to crisp fresh air, taking in the majestic beauty of mountains and lakes, and admiring cherry blossoms and local arts. Unveil one of Japan's best-kept secrets of lush greens and languid luxury.

PEAK BEAUTY

Rising majestically at 2899 metres is Mount Akadake, the main peak of Yatsugatake. Legend has it that the Yatsugatake Mountains were once higher than Mount Fuji. Jealousy urged Konohanasakuya-hime, the Goddess of Mount Fuji to tear down Yatsugatake into a collection of volcanic mountains. With the magnificent Mount Akadake and the Southern Alps' curving smoothly across

blue skies, Yatsugatake is breathtaking in the beautiful morning light. Hop on the Kita Yatsugatake Rope Way to soak in the mountainous view while travelling up the summit station at 2237 metres. When night falls, gaze out at the busy skies, lit by twinkling stars.

NATURE VENTURE

For the adventurous at heart, deepen your breathtaking experience by ascending

the mountains by foot. Various hiking paths are available for casual hikers to professional alpinists. A popular route is from Minotoguchi stop, taking 4.5 hours for hiking to the peak of Akadake. Northern Yatsugatake is a gentle route perfect for first-timers, with thicker forests blocking out winds and numerous trekking guides available.

LANGUID STROLLS

If conquering mountains is not up your alley, you have the option of breathing in the mesmerising charm of Lake Shirakaba in Yatsugatake-Chushin Kogen Quasi-National Park. Take a leisure stroll to where Mount Tateshina meets Mount Kirigamine. There are pedal boats for cruising on the gleaming lake surface reflecting blue skies, white clouds and rolling mountains. Adding to Tateshina's allure are two other spectacular water bodies, Lake Tateshina and Lake Megami. Cycle by the scenic lakesides or ice-skate in a nearby rink to feel cool winds breeze through your hair.

SAKURA BLOOM

Head further north of Lake Tateshina to discover Shokoji, a Buddhist temple built in the 1970s. History and culture aside,

sure to bring your best dress and camera if you're visiting Tateshina between late April to early May.

ART ALLURE


Museums not to be missed are the Ito Modern Art Museum, Rene Lalique Museum and Tateshina Teddy Bear Museum — exhibiting over 5,000 teddy bears from all over the world. The latter attracts a surprising number of adults everyday. While Tateshina is sprinkled with distinguished exhibitions and galleries, pay special attention to the Yatsugatake Art Museum. This 1980s odd-shaped building is hidden in a densely forested slope of the mountains, near Haramura village. With an intention to seamlessly introduce a man-made building into a natural environment, Architect Togo Murano designed the space using 25 identical domes. The museum exhibits works by famed sculptor Takashi Shimizu, and Kakusen Tsugane; both artists of Haramura. It also

showcases Yatsugatake craftsmen at work, such as quilt making, dyeing, weaving,

time in Barakura English Garden, the first authentic English Garden to open in Japan in the summer of 1990. Founded by Mr. Hohei Yamada, the garden is thriving with 5,000 variants of plants. The most stunning exhibition is that of 180 varieties of old roses displayed gracefully round the year. Catch the annual world-renowned Barakura Flower Show and rub shoulders with renowned horticulturalists, garden designers, musicians and artists from around the globe. Barakura English Garden is accessible with a 20-minute ride on the bus from Chino Station or driving via Suwa Interchange.

TIP: Climbing experts advise beginners to plan for summertime hikes because the temperature at higher altitudes tend to drop significantly as night falls. Remember to pack your warm clothing, waterproof gear, a topographic map and plenty of drinks for hydration.

GETTING THERE

BY CAR

A journey from Tokyo begins at Takaido Interchange on Chuo Highway. Continue on Suwa Interchange and drive to Tateshina Kogen. This route requires only 2 hours.

Driving from Nagoya will take 2.5 hours. Starting at Nagoya Interchange on Tomei Highway, travel onto Komaki Junction on Chuo Highway leading to Suwa Interchange, then Tateshina Kogen.

If you're big on road trips, travel from Osaka taking the Toyonaka Interchange on Meishin Highway to Komaki Junction, then continue on the above suggested route departing from Nagoya. Turn on the radio and enjoy a scenic drive for approximately 4 hours and 15 minutes.

BY TRAIN

All train routes should bring you to Chino Station as the final destination. Hop on the Chuoh Tosen Express at Shinjuku Station for an approximate 2-hour direct trip.

If you're starting your journey from Nagoya Station, take the Chuo Saisen Express and change trains at Shiojiri Station towards Chino Station. This journey requires approximately 2.5 hours of travel.

Departing from Osaka will take 3.5 hours. Board the Tokaido Shinkasen (Super Express) at Shin Osaka Station, head to Nagoya Station and continue the journey from Nagoya as described.

sightings. Lucky divers have reported close encounters with the elusive Mola Molas too.

Wandering into the hinterland by foot is another great way to explore Candidasa. There are many trekking trails to take you through the padi fields and mountainous terrains of Candidasa, even across a traditional bamboo bridge. Most trekking routes pass through sites of historical and cultural significance such as water palaces, coastal temples and villages. If you are one to value authentic insights, hire a local trekking guide and be fully assimilated into the beauty of Bali. Those seeking greater challenges may opt to hike up the island's highest peak, Mount Agung.

THINGS TO SEE

The road to Candidasa is peppered with sacred temples. Stop by Pura Besakih, Bali's largest temple perched on Mount Agung, the holiest mountain in Bali. It dedicates 3 main temples to the Hindu Gods and is surrounded by 18 separate sanctuaries. On the west of Candidasa sits Hindu temple Goa Lawah, also known as Bat Cave. The walls of Goa Lawah are covered with thousands of bats, a jaw-dropping experience not to be missed.

Closer to home is Pura Candidasa, the locals' holy ground with twin temples overlooking the lagoon.

For an authentic village life experience, navigate 4.5 kilometres northwest of Candidasa and step into the ancient world of Tenganan Village (Tenganan Pegringsingan). It is one of the oldest traditional Balinese villages, and has preserved the pre-Majapahit Balinese culture and customs of the Bali Aga community. Many of the temple festivals attract visitors, with most people planning their itinerary around witnessing the annual ceremonial fight Perang Pandan (pandanus leaf war). Male villagers will put on traditional clothes and battle each other using thorny pandan leaves to celebrate Indra, the God of War.

Tenganan village is also famed for Geringsing, Bali's magic cloth. Using the double ikat (double tie) technique exclusive to the Tenganan community in Indonesia, a single piece of this rare textile takes up to 3 years to weave. Naturally, Geringsing is the traditional textile of Tenganan. The locals believe wearing the Geringsing on one's shoulders during ceremonies brings them protection.

To avoid the monsoon season,

visit Tioman between March and October when it's sunny and perfect for beachside lounging. Several resorts and ferry services do not operate during the monsoon season due to the heavy rains.

Tioman is most commonly accessed by ferry from the mainland of Mersing. Although it has its own airport, it is only frequented by one airline, flying from Singapore or Kuala Lumpur. Travelling within Tioman is often done either by jeep, or on foot. While you're there, you can hire a speedboat for some island-hopping.

I was in India during the Diwali festivities in November 2015. I have long intended to visit, but travelling solo requires intense logistics planning. So when some friends started planning for a trip to India, I unabashedly invited myself along. We travelled from Singapore to Kolkata, and to Bodh Gaya. Then we were at Varanasi, travelling to Delhi, to Agra, and back to Singapore.
