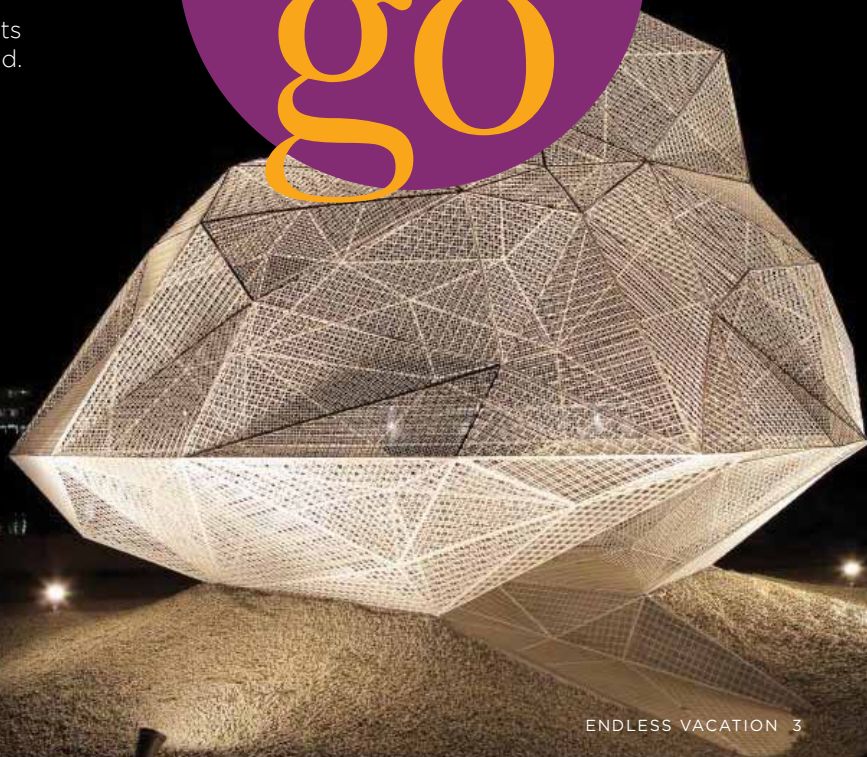

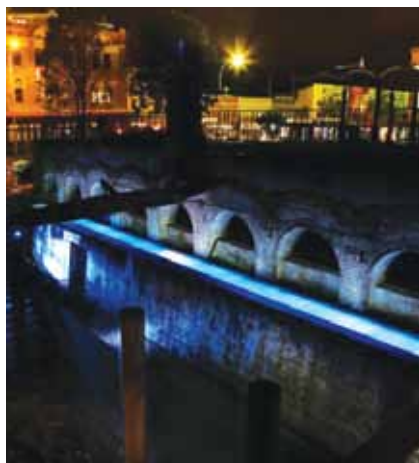
Japan's Setouchi Triennale festival highlights contemporary artists from around the world.

To see cutting-edge art this year, consider sailing to a chain of bucolic islands in central Japan's Seto Inland Sea for the Setouchi Triennale. The festival packs the calendar with exhibitions and performances on a dozen islands and in two port cities. The center of the action is 5.5-square-mile Naoshima, noted for its gorgeous Tadao Ando-designed Benesse Art Site. The project combines a six-room hotel with museums housing works by contemporary Japanese artists as well as internationally known painters, including David Hockney and Bruce Nauman. You can catch the second two installments of the three-part celebration from July 18 to September 4 and from October 8 to November 6, respectively.

Go Art and About in Australia

See Sydney through the eyes of its local talent with the festival-style Art and About programme. Touting its catch phrase 'Art in unusual Places', the programme is sure to amaze and intrigue with its infinite display of creativity.

From September to November, be dazzled by explosive cabaret acts from the 50s to 70s and witness psychedelic live shows imagined by rock music's 'Prince of Darkness' Nick Cave. In December, stop by Lotus Lane to glimpse the dynamic art mural titled 'To be free is to have no fear' by artist Nadia Hernandez.

Previous installations include a water bar serving up water from different parts of Australia, and an art installation that involved painting trees blue with a biologically safe colouring agent.

Pedestrian Bridges

Dynamic bridges that beautifully connect function and design

Striking footbridges have been cropping up lately from Singapore to Portland, Oregon, drawing locals and tourists alike. When cars don't factor into the equation, architects can tap into all kinds of creative impulses, dreaming up bridges that unfurl like fans that glitter with LED lights. Many also provide one-of-a-kind vantage points, be they of lush forests or historic city centers. In short, these bridges combine the best of form and function.

Henderson Waves Bridge
Singapore

Slinking along from one forested hilltop park to another, Henderson Waves Bridge gets its undulating shape from ribs of steel and yellow balau wood sourced from sustainable farms in Southeast Asia. Bench seating tucked into the curves creates sheltered alcoves for admiring the panorama of trees and city skyline—118 feet above bustling Henderson Road. Stroll along the bridge as part of the three-mile Southern Ridges trail, or turn up after 7 p.m., when the LED lights are blazing.

Langkawi SkyBridge
Malaysia

When is a bridge a destination in its own right? When you have to catch a cable-car ride—the world's steepest—just to reach it. That's the case here atop Mount Machinchang, more than 2,000 feet above sea level, where the SkyBridge opened, in 2005 (much of the prefab structure was brought in by helicopter). The cable-stayed bridge bends around a single support pylon, providing a shifting perspective of rain forest, waterfalls and ocean as you cross it. Recent upgrades include a glass-bottomed middle section that's sure to get your adrenaline pumping.

Pedro e Inês Footbridge
Coimbra, Portugal

A zigzag shape gives this bridge a disjointed look, as if the two ends, coming from opposite banks of the Mondego River, won't manage to meet in the middle. And that's fitting given that the 14th-century Portuguese lovers Pedro and Inês were fated not to be together. Jagged pieces of pastel glass cover the balustrades, filtering coloured sunlight onto the walkway. The overall effect is to add some modern flair to the well-preserved medieval university town of Coimbra.

Merchant Square Footbridge
London, England

This London bridge cascades with a dazzling grace—five steel beams descend in the manner of a handheld fan being folded. Unveiled in 2014 by Knight Architects, Merchant Square is the latest footbridge with wow factor to open along the Grand Union Canal, in Paddington Basin. (The nearby Rolling Bridge opts to make way for boats by curling up into a ball.) The convenience and visual appeal of these structures enliven the neighbourhood atmosphere, setting a precedent for the boutique hotel, garden and event space currently in the works.



BP Bridge

Millennium Park, Chicago

Millennium Park has become a favourite among Instagrammers, thanks to public art like Anish Kapoor's reflective bean-shaped Cloud Gate sculpture. The striking design of Frank Gehry's first-ever bridge rivals these large-scale works. The 925-foot walkway, sheathed with scale-like metal plates, snakes along from the park to the Daley Bicentennial Plaza. Not only is it a convenient way to rise above traffic-clogged Columbus Drive while delivering city skyline and lakefront views, it also muffles the noise from cars below.



Tilikum Crossing

Portland, Oregon

Portland's first new bridge in 40 years makes room for foot traffic, bikes, light-rail trains, buses, streetcars...all modes of transport except cars. Tilikum means 'people' in the local Chinook language, and the structure links two former industrial neighborhoods where Portlanders increasingly choose to live and hang out (the South Waterfront and Central Eastside). Yet it also pays tribute to nature. The white cables' angles mimic the outline of Mount Hood, and osprey-nesting poles await at both ends. The LED lighting even changes according to the Willamette River's temperature, height and speed.



Webb Bridge

Melbourne, Australia

Local artist Robert Owen and architects Denton Corker Marshall came up with a weblike design inspired by aboriginal fishing traps and baskets. They incorporated elements of the original rail bridge to create this updated version, across the Yarra River in Melbourne's burgeoning Docklands area. (Take a breather at one of WTC Wharf's alfresco riverfront restaurants.) Since its 2004 debut, Webb Bridge has attracted pedestrians, cyclists and the occasional wedding party posing for photos within the bridge's cocoon.



Capilano Suspension Bridge

Vancouver, Canada

The bridge, suspended over Capilano Canyon, just north of Vancouver, dates from 1889 and was constructed simply of hemp rope and cedar planks. If vertigo starts to set in as you walk the 450-foot-long, 230-foot-high span, take heart from the knowledge that steel cables embedded in concrete now shore it up. Besides, it's a well-trod path taken by many of the 700,000-plus folks who visit the park annually. Other, more recent attractions include the glass-bottomed CliffWalk and Treetops Adventure, a series of viewing platforms amid old-growth trees.



Puente de la Mujer

Buenos Aires, Argentina

For his first project in Latin America, Spanish architect Santiago Calatrava modelled a bridge on the silhouette of a couple in a tango lunge. But making that connection takes a stretch of the imagination; at first glance it's more likely to bring to mind a harp. Still, Puente de la Mujer (Bridge of the Woman) became an instant icon when it opened in 2001. It also fit right in with the revitalised Puerto Madero neighborhood, where the streets are named for notable women and stylish porteños come to play at night, when the white bridge is illuminated.



Moses Bridge

Halsteren, Netherlands

Much like its biblical namesake, this bridge parts the water—specifically, the moat leading up to Fort de Roovere, one of a series of 17th-century fortresses in the southwest Netherlands. Moses Bridge grants access to the historic site while creating an optical illusion that appears to preserve the traditional purpose of a moat: hindering enemy access. (The span, which is even with the water, effectively vanishes when seen from a distance; head on it looks like a narrow trench.) Dutch firm RO&AD used a nontoxic coating to waterproof the wood and installed pumps to prevent any flooding of biblical proportions.

Beyond Cancún

Tropical islands, Mayan ruins and colonial cities wait just outside Cancún.

Most visitors head to Cancún to kick back on its white sand beaches and explore its vibrant nightlife. But there's even more to do just outside the city. Here are four day trip ideas for all types of travellers.

STEP INTO HISTORY

The colonial city of Valladolid, one of the first Spanish settlements on the Yucatán Peninsula, lies roughly midway between Cancún and the Mayan ruins at Chichén Itzá. It's a great place to stop for an authentic Yucatecan lunch followed by shopping for handcrafted souvenirs, such as intricately woven hammocks sold in the main plaza by ladies dressed in embroidered huipiles (traditional shifts). Be sure to venture over to the cobblestoned Calzada de los Frailes (Pathway of the Monks), which leads to a beautifully restored colonial-era neighborhood filled with historic homes and the 16th-century San Bernardino de Siena monastery. It also branches off to side roads that lead to several dramatic caves and cool freshwater swimming holes called cenotes.

SWIM WITH WHALE SHARKS

Schools of whale sharks—the world’s largest species of fish, which can reach lengths of 40 feet and a weight of about 11 tons on a diet of plankton—migrate to the warmer waters near Cancún from May to September. During these months, thousands of people head to the shore, eager to swim beside these docile giants. Cancún-based EcoColors offers responsible whale shark snorkel trips led by certified guides. Tours to feeding grounds are regulated, and swimmers are prohibited from touching the creatures and using flash photography.

UNWIND ON A TROPICAL ISLAND

Funky Isla Mujeres lies about 12 miles northeast of Cancún yet seems a world apart.

The pace is languid here, and many people get around by scooter or golf cart instead of by car. Consider beginning your visit at the downtown waterfront then making your way to Garrafón Natural Reef Park, where parrotfish nibble on coral in clear waters and hammocks sway invitingly beneath palms. Activities include snorkelling, kayaking, swimming and biking. Afterward you can toddle back to town along the island’s windward side for a bit of shopping and a seafood lunch before taking a ferry back to Cancún.

FOLLOW MAYAN FOOTSTEPS

The Tulum ruins may be the most photographed Mayan archaeological site in the region, but no picture could capture the

beauty of these pale gray limestone structures, set on bluffs above the turquoise sea. You can reach the ruins 80 miles south of Cancún in a rental car or by bus, or sign up for an organised tour. Just be sure to get there early in the day, before crowds mar the scenery. Shady trails wind past the well-marked buildings that formed a seaport for commercial trading between the 13th and 15th centuries. The largest, El Castillo, is thought to have been a lighthouse that helped guide ships through the reefs. Be sure to bring a swimsuit so you can take a dip in the cove below El Castillo. Small hotels and cafés line the long beach south of the ruins. To wind up your visit, try the pasta or poached fish at Posada Margherita, a hangout popular among travellers.

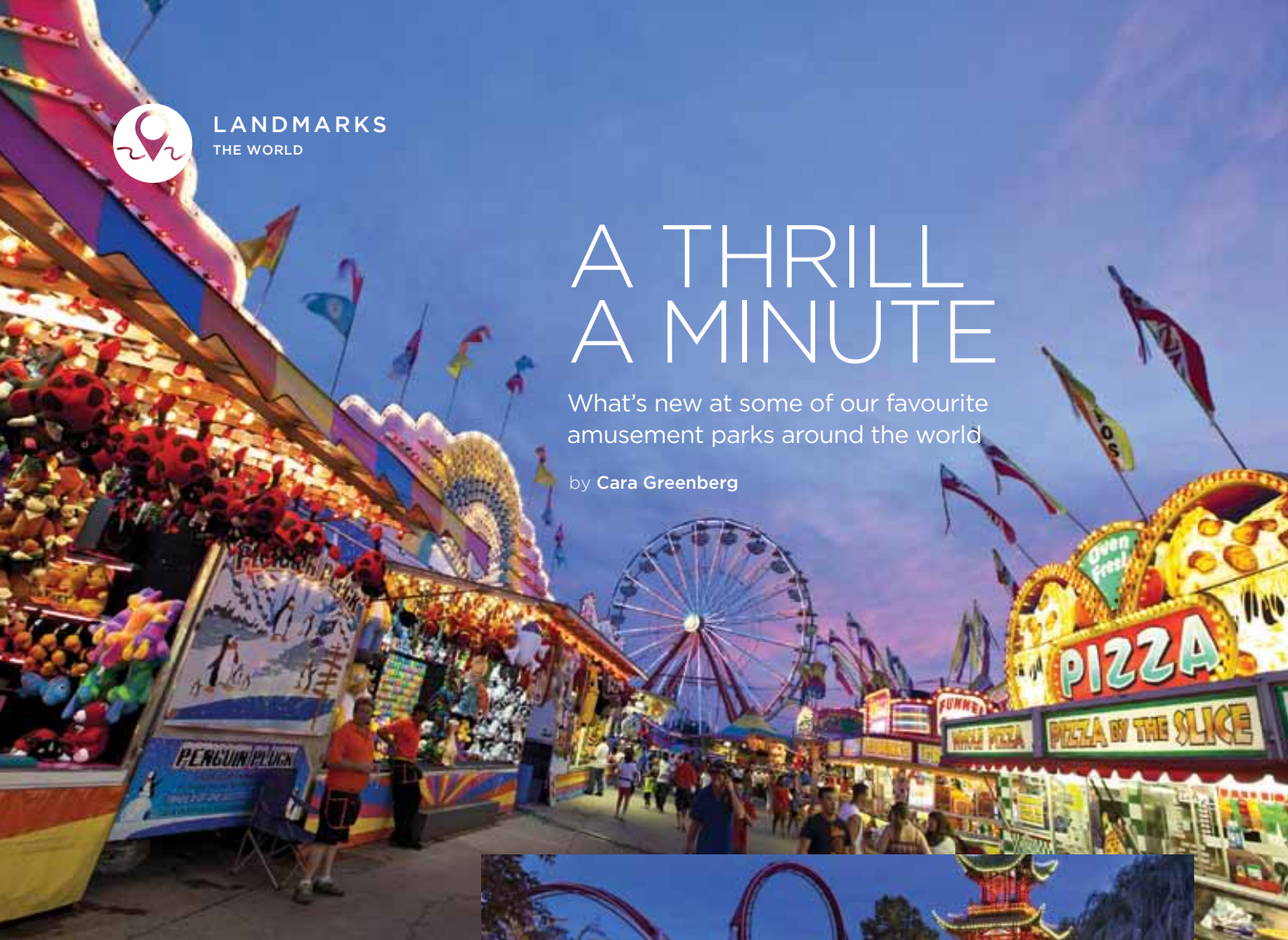

What's new at some of our favourite amusement parks around the world

Nothing says summer like roller coasters, waterslides and other adrenaline-rush-inducing thrill rides. From the most extreme to the enduring classics of childhood memory, these nine parks deliver. Step right up for summer fun!

PortAventura

Salou, Spain

This seaside park, an hour from Barcelona, recently expanded to the tune of \$90 million, adding exciting new features. The park's Himalaya-theme Shambhala coaster is the tallest and fastest on the continent (83 miles an hour); and the water toboggan King Khajuna is Europe's highest, at 10 stories. Gentler souls can drift in tubes down the lazy river in the new Costa Caribe Aquatic Park section.

Tivoli Gardens
Copenhagen, Denmark

Copenhagen, Denmark

A national treasure since 1843, Tivoli is an amusement park with two dozen rides as well as a lake and gardens, all packed into 21 acres in central Copenhagen. The big news for 2014 was the restoration of the century-old wooden roller coaster. But this venerable park keeps up with the times, as evidenced by Aquila, a state-of-the-art ride unleashing four g's of centrifugal force on riders.

Europa-Park

Rust, Germany

Go eye level with ladybugs in the new Arthur: In the Minimoys Kingdom, the largest indoor attraction added to Germany's behemoth theme park since it opened in 1975. Mammoth ants and bees and skyscraping blades of grass turn detailed scenes from French film titan Luc Besson's fantasy saga *Arthur* and the Invisibles into a dream universe. Of course, the 210-acre park has some fantastic roller coasters among its 100-plus attractions, like the Blue Fire, its first coaster with inversions.

Coney Island

Brooklyn, New York

A wonder of the world when electric light was new, Brooklyn's Coney Island still draws the crowds for boardwalk honky-tonk—750,000 for the outrageous, arty Mermaid Parade alone (June 21 in 2014). Sideshows by the Seashore is one of the country's last venues for sword swallows, fire-eaters, contortionists and snake charmers. The legendary 1927 Cyclone roller coaster, the swinging cars of the 150-foot Wonder Wheel and the refurbished circa 1906 carousel has some steep competition with the sleek new Thunderbolt, a modern-day steel looping coaster with corkscrew turns and a stomach-tossing 125-foot drop. coneyisland.com; *book of 40 tickets, SG\$48 (number of tickets per ride varies)*



Steel Pier Amusement Park

Atlantic City, New Jersey

Grab a pair of wraparound shades and head for the Jersey Shore, where \$23 million in recent improvements to the Steel Pier Amusement Park has brought the iconic 116-year-old attraction into the present day. Extending 1,000 feet into the ocean, the pier features two dozen rides, from such kiddie classics as Beach Buggies and the double-decker carousel to daredevils' favourites, like the Slingshot, the Mix and the Freedom Flyer, all aglow in retro colors at night. steelpier.com; *book of 35 tickets for SG\$42 (number of tickets per ride varies)*

Massanutten Waterpark

McGaheysville, Virginia

It's all about H₂O at Massanutten's Waterpark, part of the four-season Massanutten Resort in the Blue Ridge Mountains. From Memorial Day to Labour Day, outdoor attractions like the Rockingham Racer, a competitive four-person downhill slide, join year-round rides like Skyline Falls-250 feet of sharp turns and sudden drops. The Massanutten Meltdown, a bit of everything from water cannons and waterfalls to a giant tipping bucket, is a sure thrill as well. There's the Frog Pond for the little ones and tubing at Peak Splash and the Blue Ridge Rapids, and the surf's always up at the popular Pipeline. massresort.com; *adults SG\$52, kids SG\$35*

Busch Gardens

Tampa, Florida

The jewel-spangled land of Pantopia, a celebration of ancient lore and fantastical architecture, debuted at Busch Gardens Tampa in 2014. Its centerpiece: Falcon's Fury, North America's tallest freestanding drop tower. Riders will pivot in midair

into a facedown dive earthward at 60 miles an hour. This is also the site of one of the country's largest zoos, famed for its 65-acre Serengeti Plain®, where you'll find endangered Grévy's zebras, reticulated giraffes and Malayan tiger cubs. buschgardens.com; *adults SG\$111, kids SG\$104*

Six Flags Fiesta

San Antonio, Texas

Is a six-story free-fall your idea of a good time? Then you'll love Bahama Blaster, the new waterslide with a trap-door launching pad at Six Flags Fiesta. After the floor drops out beneath you, you'll race in a clear capsule through twists, loops and coils before ending with a splash. And the year-old Iron Rattler is a high-tech marvel of a roller coaster, combining a wooden support structure with a steel track and rails for ultra-smooth turns, inversions, flips and barrel rolls. sixflags.com/fiestatexas; *adults SG\$88, kids SG\$71*

Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk Amusement Park

Santa Cruz, California

Familiar to film buffs (The Lost Boys, Sudden Impact, Harold and Maude) and renowned for its stunning Pacific Ocean backdrop, the Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk Amusement Park is home to the 1924 Giant Dipper roller coaster as well as the handcarved 1911 Looft Carousel, one of a handful of vintage merry-go-rounds anywhere with a working ring dispenser and an original Victorian pipe organ. Old-fashioned carnival games line the boardwalk, while a 300-game arcade offers nostalgic throwbacks, like Pac-Man and Space Invaders, as well as the latest in video games. beachboardwalk.com; *one day of unlimited rides, SG\$4*

SHOPPING FOR KIWIANA



You can't leave New Zealand without purchasing some 'kiwiana', a range of quirky items that define what it means to be Kiwi. Here, we shortlist the most popular and kitsch – make space in your luggage.

THE BUZZY BEE

The popular toy was first designed in the 1930s by Maurice Schlesinger, and featured a bee with rotating wings and a clicking noise when the wings were pulled. It first became popular during the post-war baby boom, and an animated TV series Buzzy Bee and Friends was made. Today, you can see it on books, jigsaws and even clothing, but nothing beats bringing your nieces and nephews the real thing. (buzzybee.co.nz)



LEMON & PAEROA

Traditionally made with lemon juice and carbonated mineral water from the town of Paeroa, L&P is New Zealand's most famous soft drink. Its intentionally pretentious advertising slogan 'World famous in New Zealand' has become a popular Kiwi saying today. If you're serious about getting to the source of things, let curiosity drive you to the town of Paeroa. You will be greeted by a very large bottle at the end of the street explaining the history of the drink. Here's to a refreshing souvenir you wouldn't want to miss!

tool, it has today sold over three million copies, and remains the bestselling New Zealand book today. It is said that every Kiwi has an Edmonds recipe to which special memories are attached. PAVLOVA

This meringue-based dessert was named after the Russian ballerina Anna Pavlova when she toured Australia & New Zealand in the 1920s. This debatable dessert is often the centre of a friendly trans-Tasman rivalry as to its Kiwi or Australian origins. Be sure to ask for this crisp dessert with a moist marshmallow-like centre when you visit New Zealand. We recommend leading Auckland restaurant Euro for a delectable mini pavlova with feijoa sorbet, manuka honey meringue and raspberry shard. Irresistible! NUMBER 8 WIRE

This humble 0.16" gauge wire has entered 'kiwiana' status for good reason. As this wire was traditionally the most preferred wire for sheep fencing, it lent itself to several other tasks. Today, it is a symbol of the Kiwi adaptability, and is used as a phrase to mean fixing something with some ingenuity. Who needs a handyman!

EDMONDS COOKERY BOOK

This recipe book has become a quintessential ingredient in New Zealand kitchens. First published by a manufacturer of baking powder in 1908 as a marketing

A mesmerising mosaic of over 300 lush islands, it's no surprise that Fiji is ranked within the 10 top travel destinations in the world.



In the Lap of Luxury

SUN, SURF, SEA

An independent island country located in the South Pacific, Fiji has made its name being a getaway hotspot, and for good reason. Over the decades it has earned titles as one of the best diving spots, and one of the best overall travel destinations in the world.

The quintessential Fiji experience undeniably involves a fair amount of time spent exploring its cerulean depths. Known as ‘the soft coral capital of the world’, the island country is the perfect place to snorkel, whether you’re a beginner or a seasoned swimmer. First-timers have dozens of shallow snorkel sites close to shore rife with rich marine life to explore. For a closer look at Fiji’s extensive aquatic life, the Namena Marine Reserve is an



excellent choice. Creatures including sea turtles, blue ribbon eels and tiger sharks roam freely among sea fans and coral.

You can also traverse the depths of the Somosomo Strait to witness the glory of the Rainbow Reef, a kaleidoscopic marvel that is home to equally iridescent fauna. Dive in and you’ll find yourself in the midst of countless brightly hued fish like the Squarespot or Lyretail.

Fiji is also a choice locale to catch a few waves, although with crests rising up to 20 feet, some experience is recommended. Every year, world champion surfers flock to the island for a bit of friendly





competition. Beginners and novices can still catch a few tamer waves, with surf resorts and instructors conducting regular lessons.

If you'd prefer to simply lounge back and enjoy the breathtaking view, head to Yasawa Island or Malolo Island. Translated to mean 'Heaven' in Fijian, Yasawa Island lives up to its name, its crystal clear waters and warm sands the perfect place to soak up some sun. The palm tree shade and hammocks on the secluded Malolo Island are equally inviting.

UNEARTH HIDDEN GEMS

Fiji is not just paradise for tourists. Home to the second happiest people on earth, it holds a variation of religious institutions, from churches and mosques to Sikh and Hindu temples. The country is an ideal vacation spot year-round because it's safe to say that at any given time, locals are celebrating a range of festivities, between Diwali, Christmas and Prophet Mohammad's birthday. Its population is an amalgam of natives from Asian, European and Fijian heritage, contributing to its culture of warmth and hospitality.

To get a taste of this cultural melting pot, try one of Fiji's signature forms of cooking—the Lovo. 'Lovo' is 'feast' in the native language. What makes a lovo dish unique is that it is cooked in the ground itself. Heated stones are placed in a shallow pit in the earth, and are used to heat chicken, fish or pork, which is wrapped in leaves. The meat is topped with a healthy serving of root crops like tapioca to produce a wholesome and tantalising meal that's infused with natural barbecued smokiness.



GETTING THERE

The best way to get to Fiji is by flight. Hop on a plane from several international airports for a direct line to paradise on earth. Although Nadi International Airport is the primary Fijian airport destination, there are other domestic airports for you to choose from.

Island hopping is a breeze with plenty of speed boat services available to take you from one exquisite location to another. Buses and taxis are also available to ferry you around the islands at prices that can go as low as SG\$4.

Clam Chowder

A great chowder that's brothy and full of clams.

I'll never forget my first taste of clam chowder. Our family friend Alice, a New England native, had made a pot for us. Alice later shared her recipe with my mother, who cooked it often for my brother and me. Alice's chowder was redolent of salt pork and onions, with a light, milky base and perfectly chewy clams.

Restaurants and lobster pounds across New England prepare clam chowder in different ways. Many recipes call for flour (in the form of a roux) as a thickener. The more flour added, the thicker the chowder will be. Alice's version, which I've re-created below, will always be my favourite. And like any good soup, it's so much better the next day.

CLAM CHOWDER

24	cherrystone or large steamer clams, scrubbed of any grit	1	quart whole milk
		1	pint heavy cream or half-and-half
1/3	cup dry white wine		
1/4	lb salt pork or bacon, diced	1	bottle clam juice (if needed)*
1	medium onion, diced		Salt and freshly ground black pepper (to taste)
1	stalk celery, diced		
6	Russet or Yukon gold potatoes, peeled and diced		Chopped parsley and oyster crackers (garnish)

In a saucepan, add wine to clams, then cover, and cook over medium heat until they open. Remove clams from pan, extract the meat and roughly chop. Set aside. Pour broth left in saucepan into a bowl, making sure to leave any sediment in the saucepan; set broth aside.

In a sauté pan, cook salt pork over medium heat until crisp, 5 to 7 minutes. Remove with a slotted spoon to drain on paper towels; leave remaining fat in the pan. Cook onions and celery in the same pan over medium heat, about 7 minutes.

In a soup pot, cover potatoes with the reserved clam broth and cook until tender, about 20 minutes. Add salt pork, onion, celery, clams, milk and cream. Bring to a simmer and continue cooking 15 minutes, but do not boil.

Taste for seasoning. Serve with chopped parsley and oyster crackers.

Serves 8 to 10.

**Add the bottled clam juice to the potatoes if your steamed clams don't yield enough juice to cover them.*

Glorious GOA

This idyllic Indian getaway, bordering the Arabian Sea, is home to powder-soft beaches, whitewashed churches and fragrant spice farms.

India's smallest state, a palm-fringed crescent with a Portuguese accent, is arguably its most enchanting. Curled along the country's lush western coast, Goa was once a thriving Spice Route colony that in its heyday, in the early 1500s, had a population larger than Lisbon's. After Portugal ended its 450-year occupation, in 1961, Goa became a hippie haven, synonymous with beachfront raves and the backpack brigade. But it's currently in the midst of a more sophisticated transformation, drawing millions annually for its ocean adventures, spiritual sanctuaries and unflappable allegiance to all things *susegad*—a local term that traces its roots to the Portuguese word *sossegado*, or "quiet." The word captures the state's affinity for easy living. Here we present a weeklong itinerary that you can follow in its entirety or adapt for yourself. Whether you're wandering the old city's Baroque basilicas, touring a cinnamon plantation or lounging on a gleaming stretch of the 63-mile coastline, it's hard to get enough of sun-speckled Goa, or its homegrown calm.

To get around, you can rely on the region's comprehensive local bus network, hire a taxi (your resort can help you arrange this) or hail the humbler alternative: an auto rickshaw. Bicycles are also readily available for rent in most Goan towns.

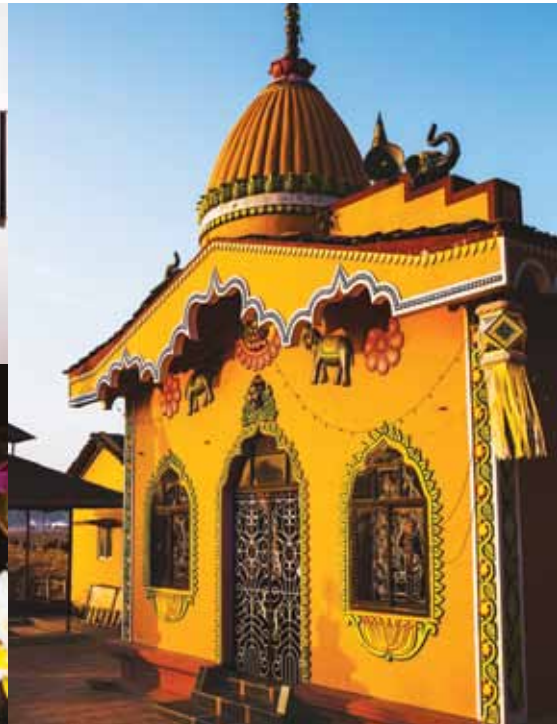
DAY 1: Historic Heart

Start with a healthy dose of the past: a **Heritage Walking Tour** excursion (*Panjim Inn; E-212 31st January Rd., Fontainhas; 011-91-832-222-6523; tours, from SG\$10* a person*) to the brightly coloured Latin Quarter in the state capital of Panaji, which is also sometimes known by its English name, Panjim. Goa's colonial history is palpable in the cobblestoned alleys of Fontainhas and São Tomé, lined with mango trees, wrought iron balconies and terra-cotta rooftops. For a break, duck into **Gallery Gitanjali** (182 31st January Rd., Fontainhas; 011-91-832-242-3331; gallerygitanjali.com), which doubles as a café and exhibits abstract oil canvases by a rotating cast of Indian painters, in addition to a sizable collection of Scandinavian art. If you're craving more history, make your way to Old Goa, the region's ancient center (a 20-minute drive from Panaji), complete with beautifully preserved convents and churches. Highlights include the UNESCO-certified 400-year-old **Bom Jesus Basilica** (*Old Goa Rd., Bainguinim; 011-91-832-228-5790*), where a silver casket contains the mortal remains of St. Francis Xavier, and the grand **Sé Cathedral** (*Velha*). End the day with an hour-long evening cruise on the Mandovi River

(*Santa Monica Jetty, Avenida Dom João de Castro, Patto Colony, Panaji; sunset cruises, from SG\$4 a person*); Goan folk musicians will serenade you on board.

DAY 2: The Life Aquatic

Get your morning chai fix at **Mapusa Market** (*Mapusa; every Monday–Saturday; 8 a.m.–6:30 p.m.*) and its kaleidoscopic array of kiosks, which hawk everything from Goan pottery to homemade pickles. Nearby Anjuna is the site of countless party shacks, including the renowned **Curlye's** (*near flea market, Monteiro Vaddo, Anjuna; 011-91-955-247-1720; curlyesgoa.com*), a two-story seaside wonderland that's a restaurant, an inn, a shopping mall and a dance club. But if you're looking to skip the swarms, go 20 miles north to Arambol Beach. Follow a winding road dotted with souvenir stalls and you'll end up at a curvy shore with gentle waves and easy access to **Arambol Sweet Water Lake**, a cliff-side launchpad that's perfect for paragliding (*independent operators are scattered among the shacks on Arambol and along neighboring Kalacha Beach; a 10-minute flight, about SG\$34*). Or opt for a surfing lesson—beginners are welcome too—courtesy of the international team at **Surf Wala** (*Bag Dando*



Rd., near surf club, Arambol; 011-91-962-300-1810; surfvala.com; 1.5-hour lessons, from SG\$48), where instructors give classes in English, Japanese, Russian and Hindi, among other languages.

DAY 3: Au Naturel

Keep the outdoor adventures going with a biking trip to **Fort Aguada**, a 17th-century Portuguese bastion (*the location for many a Bollywood movie scene*), one of Goa's largest forts, on Sinquerim Beach—about 10 miles from Panaji. The rugged red laterite landmark, which was built to keep out Dutch invaders, is named for the freshwater spring it once housed. Book a guided tour through **Goa Nature Trails** (011-91-703-097-3005; goanaturetrails.com; trips, including a helmet and light refreshments, from SG\$42), a reliable Candolim-based operator offering a three-hour mountain-bike outing that takes in a succession of fishing villages and the Church of St. Lawrence, perched on a hilltop and dedicated, appropriately enough, to the patron saint of sailors. The company also leads an hour-long guided kayaking trip along the backwaters of Nerul, a sleepy hamlet with a prawn hatchery and a cluster of charming riverside bungalows.

DAY 4: Spice It Up

No trip to this former Spice Route hot spot is complete without a plantation excursion. At **Tropical Spice Plantation** (A-14 Arla Bazar Keri, Ponda; 011-91-832-234-0329; tropicalspiceplantation.com; admission and lunch, SG\$8), in central Goa, after being welcomed with a wreath of fresh flowers, you'll learn about the many medicinal benefits of your lush surroundings—home to black pepper, cardamom, nutmeg, vanilla, cinnamon and coriander plants—on an engaging 45-minute tour. It's followed by a hearty Goan buffet lunch of fish curry, fried potatoes and vegetable pulao served on banana leaves. On your way back to Panaji, consider a stop at the pretty **Mystic Meadows** (Rajnagar, Pissal Priol, near Khedekar Industries, Ponda; 011-91-832-298-5174; bcogoa.org; admission, SG\$2), a fledgling butterfly-and-bee conservatory run by a budding wildlife painter, and the **Shri Shantadurga Temple** (Verem–Nerul Rd., near Chamundeswari petrol pump, Verem;shreesantadurga.com), an 18th-century shrine dedicated to the Hindu goddess of peace—and a vibrant example of Indo-Portuguese architecture.

DAY 5: Southern Hospitality

To spend a day on Goa's more serene and soft-spoken side, head south. Begin with a visit to the **Goa Chitra Museum** (St. John the Baptist Church Rd., Mondo-Waddo, Benaulim; 011-91-832-657-0877; goachitra.com; admission, SG\$4), artist Victor Hugo Gomes's extensive ode to Goan history,

crammed with 4,000 regional objects, including farming tools, kitchen utensils and rare pottery. You can stock up on souvenirs at **Margao Market** (Gandhi Market Rd., Margao; Mon.–Sat., 8:30 a.m.–9 p.m.), a series of stalls in south Goa's capital city where you can sift through spices, soaps and household goodies. For a dip, there is no prettier perch than **Palolem Beach** or its slightly smaller neighbor, **Agonda Beach**. Declared one of the safest swimming spots in Goa, the former is a picture-perfect bay and a worthy kayaking and paddleboarding destination.

DAY 6: Bird's-Eye View

You can hop on a morning ferry from the Ribandar jetty (about halfway between Panaji and Old Goa) for the 15-minute ride to sleepy Chorão Island and its main attraction: the **Salim Ali Bird Sanctuary** (Chorão Island, Panaji). Here you'll find yourself amid kingfishers, purple herons, white egrets, woodpeckers and cormorants, among other feathered folks. If the tide is high, boatmen, whom you'll spot near the ferry landing, can take you on a canoe tour of the mangrove-heavy isle (1.5-hour ride, about AU\$14). Come evening, try your luck at the **Deltin Royale** (Noah's Ark, RND Jetty, DB Marg, Panaji; 011-91-869-859-9999; deltin.com;

admission, from AU\$50 a person, including a buffet dinner, unlimited drinks and playing coupons), a plush four-decker casino cruise—India's largest offshore gaming complex—with Vegas-inspired entertainment shows.

DAY 7: Meditative Magic

Soak up Goa's signature susegad spirit in Mandrem, a northern fishing village turned hideaway. As the region's unofficial yoga and Ayurveda headquarters, the town and its laid-back beach are the backdrop to the **Ashiyana Yoga Center** (Junas Waddo, Mandrem; 011-91-985-040-1714; ashiyana-yoga-go.com), a picturesque retreat and spa nestled among swaying palms. Drop-in yoga classes are available. Or indulge in a relaxing treatment at the highly rated **Shanti Ayurvedic Massage Center** (Junas Waddo, Mandrem; 91-880-620-5264; one-hour massages, from SG\$61), where you can choose from options like warm-oil and herbal-powder massages, spa pedicures and henna tattoos. Wrap up your day at **Molly's Beach Shack Restaurant** (Molly's Nest, Mandrem Beach; 011-91-787-575-0217), where you can sip a sundowner, sink your toes into the sand and gaze at a fiery sunset as you bid your Goan holiday a reluctant farewell.

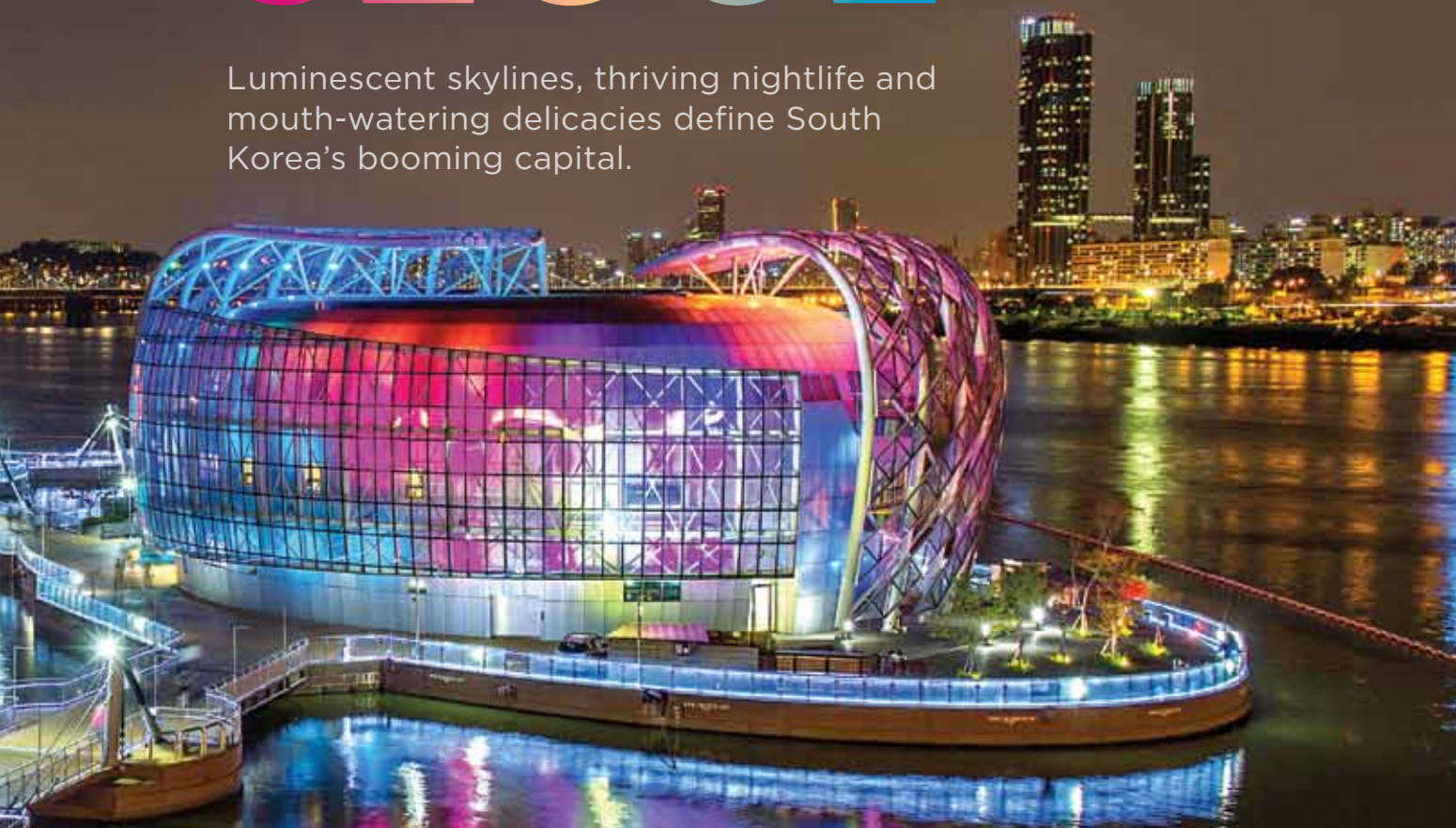

A must if you're in Seoul, explore the countless cafes peppering the streets of Garosu-gil or inject a little spontaneity into your trip and step into any quaintly decorated diner along the way. You'll find everything from cat cafes to the Dreamy Camera Café, a two-storey establishment shaped like a vintage camera.

Pamper your palate with the decadent confectionary on offer, from layered rainbow cream cakes to soft-serve topped with mini macaroons and cotton candy. Don't skip out on the Bingsoo, a refreshing ice-cold dessert with a shaved ice base, embellished with toppings like syrup, condensed milk and even fudgy brownie chunks.

For something a little more authentically Korean, the BBQ is a must-try. Now a region-wide craze, Korean BBQ is an experience in and of itself. A typical barbecue eatery gives you a rich selection of meats to grill, from black-pepper beef to tender wine-soaked pork belly. With generous servings of soup, kimchi and other tantalising side dishes, you'll be spoilt for choice.

THE PATH LESS TRAVELLED

It's not all towering skyscrapers and blazing lights in Seoul. Traditional markets like the one found in Gwangjang still give you a glimpse into Korea as it is, without the bells and whistles. While a trip along the iconic Han River is a must, consider a detour under a lush canopy of trees in Seoul Garden or Boramae Park.

If you're hoping to catch a glimpse of the famed cherry blossoms, the Songpa Naru Park between April and May is the perfect place to get a few picturesque snaps.

GETTING THERE

Getting to Seoul from more heavily populated regions like Busan is a breeze with the Korean Train Express (KTX). Racking up a speed of 300km/hr, travelling from one city to another is just a matter of 2 or 3 hours.

Express buses are also there to shuttle you between Seoul and other locales untouched by the KTX railway. Choose between economy and premium options for prices upward of SG\$3.

First-rate sushi, inventive cocktails and World Heritage sites, all without breaking the bank.

Just because you're travelling across the globe doesn't mean you have to spend a fortune—or skimp on a good time. Here are a few wallet-friendly ways to enrich your trip.

TOKYO

Consider taking advantage of your jet lag and heading to Tsukiji, Tokyo's fish market, on your first morning. Arrive around 4 a.m. if you want to watch the famous tuna auctions, at which chefs bid on 400 pounds of fish. If you prefer to sleep in a little longer, you can skip the auction and still go to the market for breakfast. Several small restaurants open to the public at 9 a.m. You may wait half an hour or more, but it's worth it to dine on some of the freshest sushi in the world. For less than SG\$41*, a chef will prepare 12 pieces in front of you. Between bites of salmon or roe, you can sip complimentary miso soup and green tea.

Fans of the film *Lost in Translation* can reminisce about the indie flick at the Tokyo Park Hyatt's ritzy New York Bar. On the top floor of a 52-story skyscraper, the bar offers spectacular panoramas of Tokyo, an extensive cocktail list and nightly jazz performances. Settle your bill before the show begins to avoid the SG\$27 cover charge (8 p.m., Monday–Saturday; 7 p.m. on Sunday). Or spend the evening at the hotel's Peak Bar, on the 41st

floor, instead. A few of the movie's scenes were shot there as well, and the Peak Bar offers one big advantage: the Twilight Time special. For SG\$41 you can watch the sunset with unlimited drinks and canapés from five to nine nightly.

KYOTO

If you're planning to travel outside Tokyo, you may want to purchase a Japan Rail pass. A one-way train ticket from Tokyo to Kyoto costs SG\$151, while the seven-day rail pass allows you to travel around Tokyo and to surrounding areas (including Kyoto) for a flat fee of SG\$163. The pass must be purchased before arriving in Japan.

Kyoto is home to 17 UNESCO World Heritage sites, many of which are Buddhist temples or Shinto shrines. Temples often charge an entrance fee, while shrines rarely do. Although the fees generally aren't expensive, they can quickly add up.

After a day of sightseeing, return to the train station for fresh sushi at bargain prices. The station contains a department store known as Isetan, where you'll find a variety of sweets, and a large selection of prepared food. The grocery store sells some of Kyoto's most delicious sushi at low prices, and slashes those prices even further about a half hour before closing, at 8 p.m.
